**FUNERAL OF KEN WILLIAMS**

REPRESENTATIVE CITIZENS ATTENDED THE OBSEQUIES.

The Service Was Conducted by Capt. (Rev.) J. V. Meagher—Many Beautiful Floral Tributes of Affection Were Received.

The funeral of the late Capt. Kenneth F. A. Williams took place to St. Mary's cathedral on Tuesday morning and was attended by representative citizens who paid their final tribute to one of Kingston's best known sons. Requiem mass was sung by Capt. (Rev.) J. V. Meagher. The pall-bearers were Lieuts. W. Hazlett, Hughes, Scott, Barrie, Gilbert and Lord.

The funeral was of a military nature, being led by the bugle band of the 3rd Canadian Garrison Regiment, which played a march as the cortege filed through the streets. A firing squad from the 3rd C.G.R., under Major W. J. McManus, followed with arms reversed. The casket, draped with the Union Jack, was borne from the cathedral by six brother officers and placed on a gun carriage drawn by four horses. The late officer's cap and sword were placed on the casket and his black charger with riding boots reversed was led immediately behind.

The late Capt. Williams' father, L. J. Williams, his two brothers, Lieut. "Jack" Williams and his brother-in-law, Dr. Ernest Sparks, were the chief mourners.

A party from the local C.A.S.C. also attended and stood with bowed heads as the bell tolled the approach of the deceased officer's remains. Behind this party, staff officers of Military District No. 3 and citizens walked.

The floral tributes that were placed on the grave in St. Mary's cemetery were beautiful expressions of the esteem with which the late Capt. Williams was held. From far and near they came, bearing their message of sympathy and condolence to his distressed family, and a silent testimony of regard for the manly officer who had passed to rest.

As the service was concluded at the grave the squad fired several volleys and "The Last Post" rang out over the silent cemetery—the final tribute of his soldier comrades to one of Canada's foremost athletes who had performed his last feat in the greatest game of all, the struggle for humanity's sake.

**ENFORCEMENT OF TRAFFIC BY-LAWS**

Acting Chief Nesbitt Adhering to Letter of Law With Good Result.

The improvements in the traffic regulations, caused by the alertness of the acting chief of police, Sergt. R. W. Nesbitt, has been commended on numerous occasions. The intolerable situation that existed some months ago when flagrant infractions of the by-laws were made before the very eyes of the constables has been radically changed for the better.

It is apparent, moreover, that the acting chief is not content to rest on his laurels and receive the congratulations of those who have noted with satisfaction the betterment in conditions. He is forging ahead, and the latest move has been the issuing of warnings to carters and firms using the services of carters that hereafter they will not be permitted to keep their carts standing on the walks nor will they be allowed to haul their conveyances over walks where there is no crossing. **POLICE GOT AFTER STOLEN AUTOMOBILE**

Made Round-up Near Harrowsmith After a Very Exciting Chase.

A special to the Whig from Napanea has the following:

"About six o'clock last evening a telephone message was received by the police, that a garage in Belleville had been entered and a car stolen. Chief Barrett and Constable Greer got trace of it and succeeded in catching up with the car at Harrowsmith, and arrested the driver, one G. Brown, of Belleville, bringing the car and Brown back to Belleville, and handed them over to the police there.

"A joy ride commenced by four Kingston young men came to an abrupt and unpleasant ending when the occupants of a car stolen in Kingston on Saturday night or early Sunday morning were arrested by Chief Barrett yesterday morning. The car, which was owned by ex-Mayor C. J. Graham, of Kingston, was badly damaged and was shipped by rail back to Kingston to-day.

"Within half an hour of receiving a telephone message from Kingston that a car had been stolen, the car was located and recovered and the joy riders were in the lock-up. One of the young men boasted of having had a number of joy rides with stolen autos last summer in Kingston."

**A POPULAR HYMN**

Was Written By a Resident of Port Hope.

How many Canadians know that the popular hymn, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," was written by a resident of Port Hope, who spent the greater part of his life in Ontario, and was buried on the shores of Rice Lake. Joseph Scriven was an Irish man, and lived for a time in a cottage at Port Hope, and for another period was tutor in the family of Mr. Pengeley at Rice Lake. Though born in a comfortable Irish home, his later life in Canada was marked by straitened circumstances, and in the end, his mind weakened by depression and disappointment, he vanished from his room one night and his body was found in a nearby water.

Scriven tried to put into his own life the doctrines of the Sermon on the Mount. Mr. Sankey, the evangelist, in his "Story of the Gospel Hymns," relates this incident:

"One afternoon he was seen walking down the streets of Port Hope carrying a sawhorse and a saw. A gentleman standing by said to a friend: 'Do you know that man? I want someone to cut wood, and I find it difficult to get a sober man to do the work.' 'But you can't get that man,' was the reply. 'That is Mr. Scriven. He won't cut wood for you because you are able to pay for it. He saws wood only for poor widows and sick people who are unable to pay for the work.'"

Though Scriven published a small volume of hymns in 1869, strangely enough it did not include the hymn for which he is famous. His grave is in a wheat field on the farm of his former pupil, T. R. Pengeley.

**THE TAYLOR MANSION**

IS BEING MADE READY FOR THE CANADIANS.

Bedding and Equipment Installed for Fifty Invalid Soldiers—Accepted by Dominion for Use of Wounded and Sick.

Bedding and other equipment has been installed in the palatial Clinton street residence of Mrs. Emma Flower Taylor, Watertown, N.Y., in preparation for the first contingent of convalescent Canadian soldiers, expected this month. After offering the home to the United States Government for use as a convalescent hospital and having the offer apparently refused, Mrs. Taylor placed the residence at the disposal of the Dominion authorities, who promptly availed themselves of the offer.

The residence is practically three storeys high and offers ample room for fifty men. The grounds cover an entire block, and include a spacious lawn and an attractive garden. There is also a two-storey garage and stable.

Mrs. Taylor has taken up her residence in her new home in South Masses street.

This will be the second home in this vicinity occupied by Canadians, the famous "stone house" at Martinsburg housing a score of them. It is expected that the first assignment of men will not exceed twenty.

**SELECTION OF CIVIC HOLIDAY.**

Citizen Thinks Monday, August 5th, Should Have Been the Date.

"I think it was very poor judgment on the part of the city in choosing last Monday as civic holiday," remarked a citizen in conversation with the Whig. "The first Monday in August has always been observed as civic holiday in practically all Canadian centres, and the result of the change to the last Monday in July in Kingston is that Monday, Aug. 5th, was a holiday practically everywhere, save in this city. I know a large number of people outside of the city who would have visited Kingston for the holiday had it been on Aug. 5th, but who could not have done so, week earlier, as it was not a holiday anywhere but in Kingston, and as a result Kingston and Kingston hotels, merchants, etc., are the losers. What was the reason for the selector of this date? There must be a reason, and I think the citizens and particularly the business men are entitled to know it."

**SUGAR MUST BE CONSERVED.**

A Pound and a Half Per Person a Month.

Reduction of household consumption of sugar in Canada to a ration of one and one-half pounds per person per month for personal use is requested by the Canada Food Board in a statement just issued. The utmost possible conservation is urged in addition to the restrictions now in force upon all manufacturers who use sugar. Householders are also asked to use yellow sugar instead of the granulated product wherever possible, because in order to get the most efficient economic results from the refining of sugar it is necessary that about 30 per cent. of yellow sugar be produced by the refineries.

The Food Board's appeal is made as a result of a conference of the International Sugar Commission and a full review of the raw sugar situation, the balance of crop on hand and the allied requirements. This survey showed the necessity for strict conservation of sugar on this continent until the new crop becomes available at the beginning of next year.
