RETURNED FROM GERMANY

FLIGHT-LIEUT. ERNEST SLITER IS HOME AGAIN.

He Was Taken Prisoner—Shot Through the Legs in Airplane and Forced to Descend.

Although limping with the aid of two canes, Flight-Lieut. Ernest Slicer alighted from the fast train from the east at the Outer G.T.R. station on Wednesday afternoon, with the same old sunny smile that used to beam when Queen scored a touchdown in the football days before the war. He was met by his father, Principal E. O. Slicer.

Flight-Lieut. Slicer enlisted as a sapper with Queen's Engineers while a student at the university, October, 1914. He left for overseas at the end of the college term and served in France until he transferred to the Royal Air Force over a year ago. On July 3rd, 1917, after a thrilling duel in the air, he was shot through the legs and was forced to descend behind the German lines. It was thought for a time thereafter that he was missing, but after several weeks of anxiety his parents were assured that although he was seriously wounded in a German hospital his ultimate recovery was certain. In the latter part of May of this year he was transferred to England by way of Holland, where he awaited transportation across the ocean.

Flight-Commander W. F. Nickle, son of W. F. Nickle, M.P., accompanied Lieut. Slicer and he has developed into a strapping lad. Both of the boys were glad to get back to their home city and see the faces of their friends once more. "Doug" Nickle was one of Kingston's best known youths when he received his commission in the Forestry Corps in the summer of 1916. After several months' service with that unit in England he was taken on the strength of the Royal Air Force and while taking his course of instruction last winter he was severely burned. His machine collided with another in midair and in the crash he fell with his plane, sustaining severe injuries. He is home on furlough.

The Court of Enquiry appointed to investigate into the disappearance of Major W. J. S. Sharp, was in session all Wednesday morning and resumed hearing evidence after lunch.

H. E. W. Nicholson, G.T.R. agent at Kingston Junction, stated to the Whig, on Wednesday afternoon, that so far as he knew, no ticket was sold to Major Sharp to leave the city.

Military News

Captain James Wallace, quartermaster of No. 7 (Queen's) Canadian General Hospital overseas, returned to Canada on Tuesday and went to Renfrew.

Lieut. A. R. Merrill, 78th Battalion, reported at headquarters today. He was an arts student at Queen's when the war broke out and enlisted in Queen's military hospital under Lieut.-Col. Etherington. He went to Egypt and to France. In France he transferred to the R. C. R. and was granted a commission. He was appointed to the 78th Battalion and served on the Somme. In March last he was gassed at Lens and was invalided to Canada. His home is at Havelock.

The "Elmhurst" Convalescent Hospital has been closed, the remaining three patients being removed to Sydenham hospital. The Richardson hospital on Stuart street is now used only as quarters for orderlies.

A new hospital to be known as the Rathbun Military Hospital will be opened at Deseronto on Monday next. All R.A.F. cases will be treated there and removed for convalescence. It is reported that Major Kenneth Mundell is to command this hospital.

Lieut.-Col. R. J. Gardiner, A. D. M. S., proceeded to Watertown, N.Y., on Tuesday.

Orders issued by Brig.-Gen. G. S. Maunsell to-day contain instructions to the commanders of all units in view of the typhoid epidemic. All officers, N.C.O.'s and men who have not been inoculated are to be so treated as a preventative measure.

Last evening at Barriefield boxing bouts were staged in front of the "Y" tent. The bouts were of short duration to encourage the men in speedy work. The exhibition was put on by the training school under the supervision of Instructor Rainbow, who is doing fine work as coach.

The valley ball contest between the Engineers and the Depot Battalion was won by the latter team by a score of 3-2.

After the out-door sports, some fine stunts were pulled off in the big tent. Lieut. Micht, of the Depot Battalion, made a capable chairman.
