IN MARINE CIRCLES. Movements of Vessels in and About Kingston Harbor.

Steamer City of Ottawa arrived from Montreal at 9.30 a.m. and clear for Toronto at 1.25 p.m. on Thursday.

Steamer Sarnor arrived from Montreal at 1.40 p.m. and cleared for Toronto at 2.30 p.m. on Thursday.

Steamer Toronto arrived from Toronto at 5.10 a.m. and cleared for Prescott at 5.40 a.m. on Friday.

Steamer Samuel Marshall and barges Katie H. and Sherman arrived Friday morning on their way from Ogdensburg to Oswego.

M.T. Co's. Bulletin—Tug Thompson cleared for Montreal with three coal barges; tug Clyde cleared for Montreal with two grain barges; tug Magnolia cleared with barges Bacon and Orton for the Welland Canal; steamer Westorian cleared for Montreal with coal; steamer Arabian is due to arrive this afternoon with a cargo of grain from Port William for transshipment into river barges.

The Cape Vincent, N.Y., Eagle says: The Wolfe Island canal is used by motor boat owners of Cape Vincent when they have occasion to visit Kingston. It lessens the distance to that city materially, being about ten miles, while the trip around the head of Wolfe Island is eighteen miles and by way of the foot twenty-eight miles.

WATER NOT CONTAMINATED. Lieut.-Col. Connell Has Tests Made Every Day.

The city ambulances are kept busy removing patients to the hospitals who are thought to have the typhoid fever. Besides a number of single cases, two members of a family at the outer station and three from a family on John street have been removed.

Lieut.-Col. Connell stated to the Whig on Thursday that the city water is being carefully tested each day and that it still shows no evidences of contamination. Asked if the tests of the less exact, samples taken on Wednesday afternoon were completed, Lieut.-Col. Connell said that the result of the examinations would not be known for three days, as that time is required to ascertain the presence of typhoid germs.
