COAL AND COAL PRICES THE PRICE DROPS 20 CENTS A TON IN OTTAWA.

But Will Go Up That Amount—When Freight Rates Increase on 12th—No change in Kingston Prices. In Ottawa hard coal has dropped in price from \$10.75 to \$10.55 a ton as the result of the new fuel regulations as to charges. When the freight rates increase on the 12th inst. the price in the capital will again be \$10.75 a ton. Speaking with a prominent Kingston coal dealer on Friday morning, the Whig learned that the new increases in the freight schedule are not expected to affect the price of coal here for some time. It was stated that although the dealers had been forced to bring in more coal by rail this year than heretofore, owing to the lack of shipping and that the increases in their price would amount to thirty or thirty-five cents a ton, for the present the price would not change. In time, however, when the supply of coal brought by water was diminished, the change would be inevitable. Asked if there would be two prices for coal—one for water coal and one for rail coal—it was said that, although no action had been decided upon, it was likely that a small increase would be spread over all grades to make up for the big raise in the one grade brought by rail. This would ultimately be more fair, as it would mean a trivial increase to all consumers instead of an increase of thirty or thirty-five cents to those who had to accept the coal brought by rail. At present hard coal is selling here at \$11.50 a ton and \$11.75 for carry.

MEETING OF NAVY LEAGUE CALLED BY MAYOR HUGHES FOR MONDAY AFTERNOON.

The People Need to Be Informed of the Tremendous Work Done by the British Navy and the Need of Helping.

Mayor Hughes, president of the Kingston branch of the Canadian Navy League, has called a meeting of the members to be held in the City Council Chamber at five o'clock on Monday afternoon. All citizens who are interested in the League, which is designed to promote the welfare of the British navy as well as our great merchant fleet, are urged to attend.

The British navy has been increased 160 per cent. since the war began and the merchant fleet has increased proportionately. The work that has been performed by all of our sailors is one of the outstanding marvels of the war. Only the fact that our race has always been devoted to seafaring can account for the efficiency of our great fleets. The story of the naval engagements which shut the German fleet in the land-locked Kiel canal and the Baltic is familiar to us all, but the heroism and ceaseless vigil of the sailors who ply the trade routes is a thrilling story that has not all been told. These vessels carry munitions, equipment, merchandise and troops and but for them Canada's share in the war would have been a negligible quantity and our commerce would have lain dormant. The war has demonstrated indisputably that we hold an important place in the Empire as well as in the commercial world and it has also shown that we are dependent upon the navy and the great ocean freight carriers for our commercial growth. The future of the country demands that these shall be established upon a permanent basis and this can only be done by awakening the interest of the people.

It was a Navy League that established the German navy and made that nation a menace to the world. It created in her a consciousness of strength that tempted her rulers to seek the realization of the Kaiser's dreams. We know that our prosperity depends upon our trade and we cannot afford to neglect the sailors who now play such an important part.

The Navy League was formed for the purpose of educating the people of Canada in the work of the navy and eliciting their support in measures calculated to maintain its efficiency at the highest point.
