BETTER WAR NEWS WILL HELP FAIR

Manager Kent, of Toronto National Exhibition Predicts Big Year.

Toronto, Aug. 14.—A prediction that adverse weather alone will prevent the Canadian National Exhibition from beating its attendance record of one million is made by Manager John G. Kent. Though he does not look for as large an American patronage as in previous years, owing to the transportation congestion across the line, he believes that any falling off in that account will be more than made up by increased attendance from both the rural and urban population at home. The better war news is a strong factor in Mr. Kent's calculations.

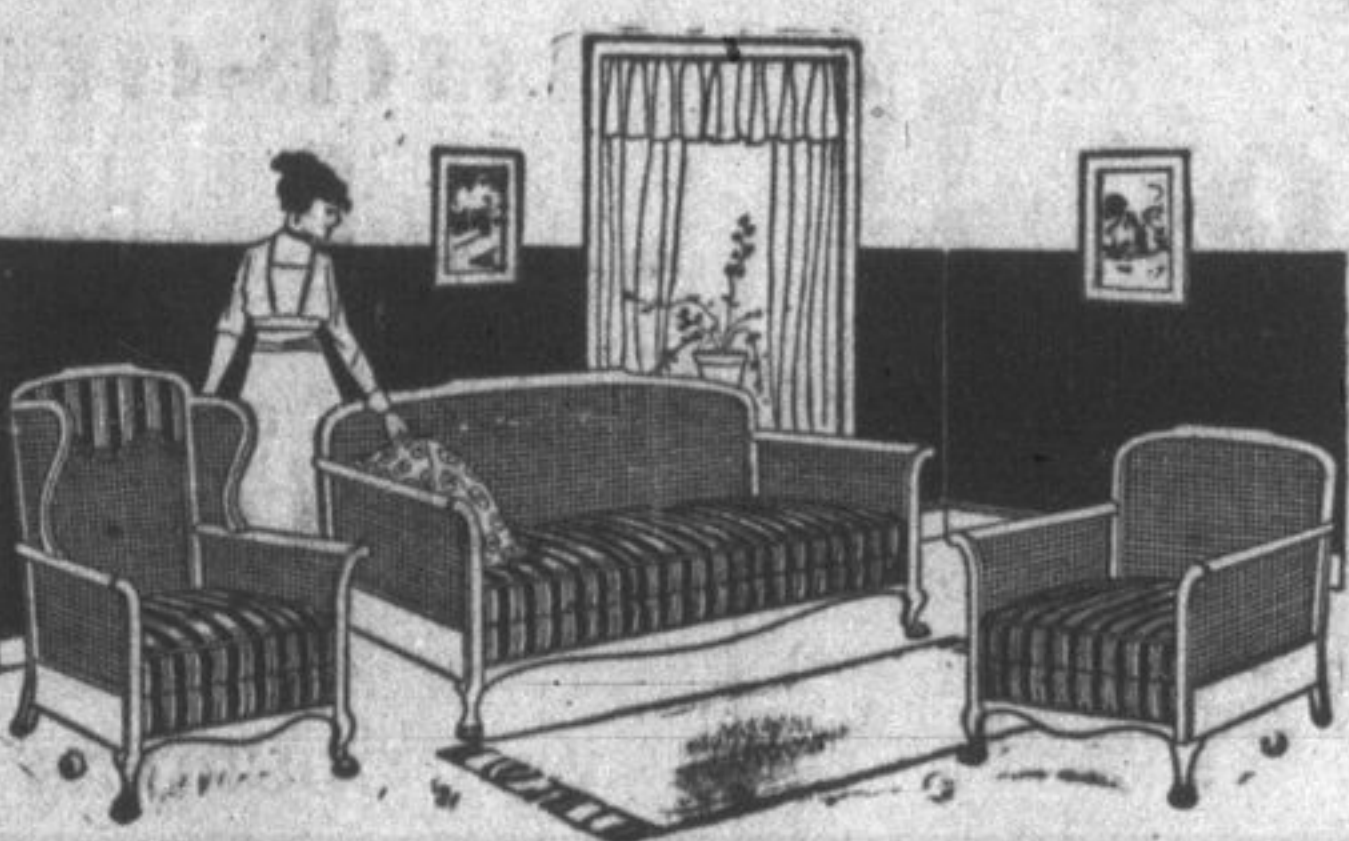
