POLICE COURT BREVITIES.

Cleaning the Muffler. There are many methods of cleaning the muffler, from heating on it with a hammer to blowing out the carbon with air. Here is a very effective way of cleaning a muffler badly choked with soot and carbon: Remove the muffler and plug up one end with a wooden plug. Pour in the other end a solution made up of half a pint of concentrated lye to half a gallon of boiling water. Shake the muffler vigorously, pour out the solution, and rinse with boiling water. This lye solution burns the hands or clothes when it touches them, so be careful of it.
