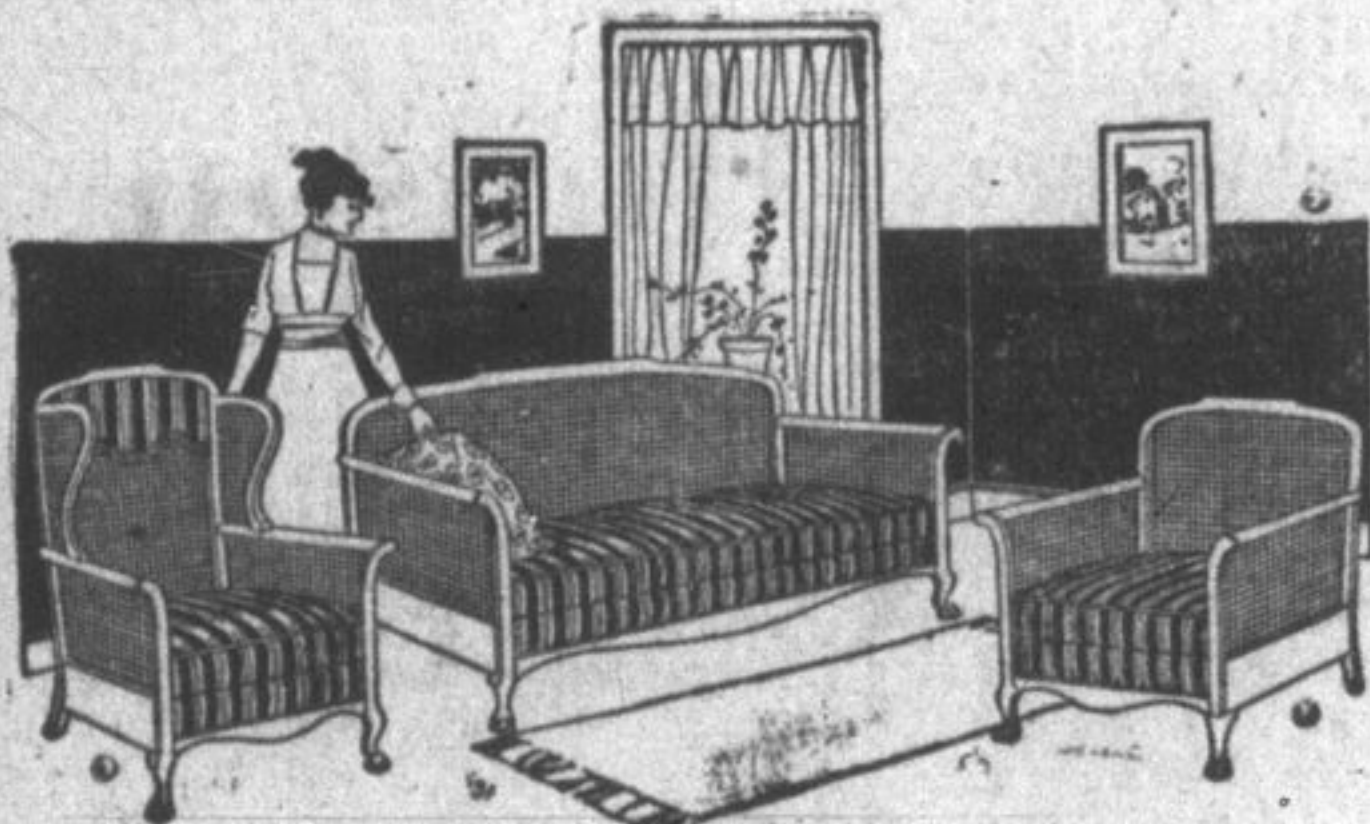

## FOCH PREPARES TERRIFIC BLOW

A New Drive is in Course of Preparation, Say Officers.

## THE ENEMY WITHDRAWING

SO AS TO PREPARE STRONG LINES IN REAR.

An All-American Attack May be Arranged on Some Point on the Line it Holds Beyond Verdun—May be a Double Drive by British.

Washington, Aug. 16.—A new drive against the German positions either in Flanders or between the Oise and Soissons, is expected by many army officers here as a result of the slowing up of the advance in the Picardy theatre.

The opinion prevailed that the present struggle around Roye and Lassigny would soon terminate in the capture of those points, to be followed by the taking of Noyon. The officers agree with the commentators abroad that all signs indicate that the enemy intends to withdraw and is fighting fierce rear guard actions only to cover his retirement and to permit him to prepare strong lines in his rear on which to stand fast.

It appeared possible to some officers that the organization of the first American army might be followed by an all-American attack at some point on the line which it holds beyond Verdun, where there has been no recent fighting. No reports, of unofficial communications, have been received, however, throwing any light on General Pershing's plans or the part assigned to him by Marshal Foch in the present offensive campaign.

Officers here anticipate a complete change in the character of the fighting in the next phase of the battle with Foch's armies assuming the offensive in the fullest sense of the word and striking to force the enemy back in such manner that he cannot avail himself of his old Hindenburg line defenses.

It appears very probable to some observers that the Flanders front might see the next blaze kindled with a double drive by British forces to pinch out the salient there as it has been pinched out at the Marne and again in Picardy. They foresee also, however, the initiation of movements of far greater scope in the near future, aimed at flanking the German front by the blunt wedge into which the Picardy and Aisne battlefronts have been merged by recent actions.

### WAS BURNED TO DEATH.

A Sad Episode at Carleton Place Last Week.

Carleton Place, Aug. 26.—Miss Julia Burke, aged seventy-two years, was burned to death on Friday in a tragic way. Early that morning she arose from bed without awaking her sister, Mrs. Nagle, who slept with her, and descended to the kitchen, where she poured coal oil into a dish and from the charred remains of a letter in another dish evidently intended to destroy some private papers which she did not wish other eyes to see. The use of the oil had a disastrous effect for when she lighted it the flames evidently flashed to her clothing and set her night dress ablaze with fatal results, her hands and arms, the upper part of the body and the face and head being dreadfully burned, and death must have been rapid by suffocation.

Her sister when she awoke missed Miss Julia and found her lying in the summer kitchen, with the blaze flickering up the walls of the building. The fire was speedily subdued. Deceased for thirty-five years taught school here.

### MUST BE MORE CAREFUL

In the Handling of Milk and Ice Cream.

The tests conducted to ascertain whether typhoid bacteria was present in the milk and ice cream consumed in the city have not shown results demanding official action. Dr. J. W. Bell made a thorough inspection of all dairies thought to have caused typhoid. He also had samples of water taken from pools where cattle drink tested, but they were not contaminated. Some watering places were badly located and likely to be contaminated, and he directed that they be no longer used. Milk dealers and ice cream vendors will not be permitted to become careless in the handling of these articles of consumption, and scrupulous cleanliness will be demanded of them at all times.

### Scuffle the Fodder Corn.

An old farmer asked about a short crop of fodder corn for the silos of Ontario, said: "If your corn seed falls in places and the stalks are far apart, then scuffle your corn. Every time you tickle the ground the plants will grow a foot in the next two days. That's the way to make a thin crop a fat one."

The steamer Western is due on Friday night with the barges Godfrey and Bacon from Port Colborne. The steamer Simla is due on Friday night with the barge Orton from Lake Erie with coal.

Bro. Major Thomas Kidd, Grand Master of the Orange Young Britons, who represented that order is a very young man with a fine military record. When the war broke out, the application of Major Kidd was the first received by the Minister of Militia from any part of Canada. The day after Britain declared war he offered himself. He went to the front, where he received seven wounds, two of which should have killed him, according to medical science. Returned to Canada unfit for further service at the front he is now assistant Q.M.-General for the Kingston District, and assistant Adjutant-General. All his blood is Orange. The Kidds have been Orangemen ever since there were Orangemen. He will some day hold still higher rank in the association.
