PORT HOPE HEARS THE HON. N. W. ROWELL

Empire's Effort in the War Reviewed by This Able Minister.

Port Hope, Aug. 16.—Hon. N. W. Rowell was accorded a most cordial and rousing reception in the drill shed here last evening by an immense throng of ladies and gentlemen from town and country. It was his first visit to Port Hope since his election as Durham's representative in December last, and the people were anxious to hear the message he had brought them from his recent visit to England. The meeting was presided over by Stanley B. Burnham, Mayor of Port Hope.

Mr. Rowell told of what the Government had done in furthering our interests in the war in the cause of democracy. Although we were assisting the weaker nations primarily, we were actually fighting for our own liberty and freedom. England had placed over six million men, and she killed more 100 per cent. greater than all the men that Canada had yet

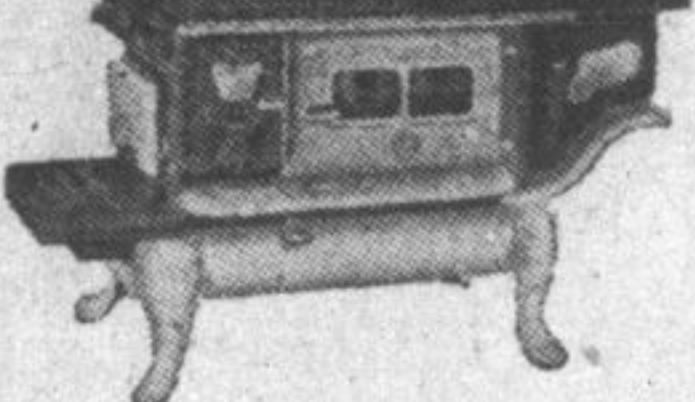
