## GERMANY'S PRESS CRIES FOR PEACE

"Two Reverses Produced Deep Emotion in German People," Says Paper.

### HERTLING'S DIFFICULT JOB

IN PLEASING ALL HIS PAN-GERMAN FRIENDS.

More Than Ever It is Necessary for Him to Take the Initiative of Courage at Once.

Amsterdam, Aug. 17.—The whole German press is sending up an urgent prayer to the Government that it should abandon its policy of silence regarding war aims and undertake raging, tearing propaganda—otherwise peace offensive—throughout the country so the German people may know definitely what they are fighting for.

The Hamburger Nachrichten even pleads for an announcement of a change in war aims. "The two reverses which German arms have suffered," it says, "have produced a deep emotion in the German people. There is no use denying that, nor ought it to be denied." It wants Hertling to follow up "the initiative of courage" displayed by headquarters, for, "more than ever it is necessary to raise the spirits of the German people." It actually thinks the best policy for the Government is to support a league of nations ideal—indeed, a strange attitude for such a preposterously imperialistic journal to take up.

The Rheinische Westfaelische Zeitung supports the demand but with a view to having such things as home rule, evacuation of Egypt, and so on definitely placed on the German programme.

So Hertling will certainly have great difficulty in pleasing all sections of his pan-German friends should he agree to the fervent petitions of enlightenment. That he is most likely to do so is clear from a statement by the inspired correspondent of the Cologne Gazette, who, writing obviously to dictation, shows how necessary it is to have clarity regarding the situation and those of the Government who are good speakers should go up and down the country making speeches and not merely wait till the Reichstag opens. So the next German peace offensive will probably take the form of a flood of Government oratory.

nor even potatoes for weeks, but all their complaints to the local food bureau have been vain. When the women complained that the local police were illegally getting double rations, they were flogged and numbers were imprisoned.

Dr. Wekerle, Minister of Finance, explained to Parliament that a mob had begun excess against the police and higher authorities. "Such proceedings," he added, "must be severely punished. The local authorities did only their duty."

The Hungarian Parliament was then prorogued for an indefinite period, after depriving twenty-two deputies of immunity from prosecution. They are charged with various crimes, from riding over farmers' corn to breaking the food laws and committing libel. One is accused of giving false cheques in payment of a debt, and Count Geza Andrássy will be prosecuted for jumping off a train going at full speed.

### PLAN TO COMBAT TUBERCULAR FOE

Dr. Hastings Believes That Many Cases of Disease Are Concealed.

Toronto, Aug. 17.—Dr. Hastings, M.O.H., has found a new field of activity. In a report presented to the local Board of Health, he recommends that a complete survey of the city be made to ascertain the exact number of persons suffering from tuberculosis, as he is under the impression that only a small proportion of the cases existing have been reported to the Health Department. This action was prompted by the results secured by similar work in the city of Chicago, where a survey was made on one of the most congested districts and the discovery was made that from "five to ten times as many cases of tuberculosis existed as had been reported to the department by the physicians." Dr. Hastings in his report also called attention to reports that had been made on this problem following investigations in other cities in the United States and in France. The figures quoted were of a startling nature indicating that the scourge is much more prevalent than most people imagine. It was stated that were the war to end to-morrow France would have a legacy of over 5,000 tubercular patients among her own people to care for.
