THEY DO NOT LIKE CONFINEMENT IN "PEN"

One Conscientious Objector Would Now Volunteer For Any Service.

It is reported that some of the conscientious objection to military service which characterized the ten men who were sentenced to ten years in the provincial penitentiary at Portsmouth is being turned into vehement objection against further confinement behind the big walls at Hatters' Bay. One who visited the men in their cells reported to have said that two days after their arrival some of them were quite ready to fight.

"If they will let me out of here you can be sure that I'll make a bee-line for the first recruiting office and volunteer for service anywhere," one is reported to have said when being medically examined.

Police Court Brevities. Magistrate Parrott disposed of two cases in the session of the police court on Friday morning. The charge of non-support of his wife, reputed to be a German, brought against Stanley Hamm, was enlarged for a week.

A complaint was also laid against Lewis Martin that he did not register a thoroughbred stallion in accordance with the Ontario Stallion Act and that he was using it. The charge was withdrawn when it was found that the horse had been taken from the barn without Mr. Martin's knowledge or consent by a young boy.

They May Separate. It is expected that formal separation will be granted to Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Denny, of Portsmouth. The former is alleged to have assaulted his wife on divers occasions, and she has announced her intention of appealing for a separation. No action will be taken against Denny for his cruelty in a court of justice. Mrs. Denny is now looking for a home where she can dwell in peace and content.
