When the water in the river is so low the stone appears, it means there is not enough water for crops and famine conditions reign. Across the face of the stone the German words, which mean "When you gaze upon me then cry," are carved. There are many dates showing low water marks, the oldest being 1417. This year the water has reached the lowest level in the river ever known.


