

Plan Proposed if Committee Fails to Finance Management. Plans are being discussed for a committee of four to act as underwriters for the Thousand Island Park Association and assume management of the property. It is expected that definite steps will be taken in

A meeting of the association was held Monday night. A soliciting committee was named at a meeting sev eral days ago to go among the cottage owners and their friends and solicit subscriptions in order to purchase the stock of E. T. Shepard, of Oneida, the majority stockholder. The committee reported at Monday night's meeting and the report was that it had met with little success. Another committee was named to

carry on the work. While the formal announcement was not made, it is known that a committee composed of G. H. Wilder, E. T. Shepard, Ernest A. Fay of Potsdam and Julius P. Sullivan of New York, will underwrite the property and take over the obligations, if the second committee fails in its effort to solicit the needed funds. Passenger's Complaint. Kingston, Aug. 28.—(To the Editor): Travellers who may be contemplating going to Montreal or intermediate points of steamboat, should know that after arising at about 4.30 a.m. and standing on an unprotected wharf, for an hour or so, they may have to be content with seeing their steamer pass by on her way to the next port, without stopping. That was the experience of some twenty intending passengers this morning

with the steamer Toronto. The explanation given (afterwards) was that an empty freighter had been tied up the night before at the Toronto's berth. The freighter and the Toronto, however, belong to the same company, and a responsible official of the company admits that he knew what would happen. It was not necessary, therefore, to keep every body on the wharf from 5.15 to 6.15 just to see it happen.
