

beautiful red, orange and golden colors. We look through dense strata of atmosphere near the earth, which are filled with the larger particles of

dust. These reflect the longer rays of light to us. The smaller particles first reflect blue, leaving yellow; then the coarser dust reflects green, leaving orange; then still coarser pieces reflect orange and yellow leaving red. Banks of clouds often intensify the colors by reflection from their under surfaces.

The absence of dust from our atmosphere might cause more serious troubles than depriving us of blue sky and heartiful sonsets. In a dustless world rain would seldom fall in sufficient quantities to maintain plant life, and evaporation would be rapid, aiding the formation of moisture-laden air and of arid tracts of land.
