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Military News

Great dissatisfaction is expressed by V.A.D. workers over the new orders from Ottawa, compelling these voluntary war workers to sign up for a certain period of service, and also at the rate of pay offered. Many good V.A.D. workers in hospitals will be lost as a result as they cannot give all their time to the work.

Sergt. Harkness, master drummer of the E.O.R. band and a former bandmaster, is endeavoring to organize a brass band among the school cadets. He is convinced that he can succeed with the material available in the city schools. The cost of the instruments is an important item to be considered, but it is felt that the money would be well spent, as the band would add new interest in the corps.
