## UP TO THE HOUSEHOLDERS

TO PREVENT A VERY SERIOUS SHORTAGE OF SUGAR.

Food Board Says Making of Heavy Preserves is Not Necessary and That It Should Stop—The Unit Which Has Been Placed on Household.

Are you conserving sugar in your home? Just at preserving time this appears to the housewife to be an unfair question to ask, but the Food Board declares that the householders are to blame if there is a sugar scarcity.

"I've got the peaches all right, but now to get the sugar," remarked a citizen, as he came out of a downtown fruit store with a basket of peaches. "Sugar is the hardest thing to get."

Although sugar is hard to get, reports go to show there has been a big sale of fruit in the city. The Food Board says that making heavy preserves is not necessary, and that it should stop.

People who do not care for sugar in their tea or coffee are conserving the sugar supply, and without any effort on their part. It is of interest to note what the Food Board has to say on the matter. The Board urges that a family of two should not use more than an aggregate of one-quarter of a level cupful of sugar per day, for cooking, table use and all other purposes, with the exception of preserving, and for all other families consumption should be limited to the same proportion.

It is stated that there will not be sufficient sugar if it is consumed in other ways in the home in the same extent as in other years.

The Food Board points out that hardships have been placed on the manufacturers, for the sake of securing a supply for the householders, and that it is now the duty of the householders to discontinue the extravagant use of sugar.
