STEAMER REPORTED ASHORE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

OSSEFRAGE WENT ON BELOW SPARROWHAWK POINT.

Passenger Steamer, which was Formerly in Service Between Chatham and Detroit—High Winds Held a Number of Vessels in Port.

The passenger steamer Ossefrage is aground below Sparrowhawk Point, three miles below Cardinal. The vessel went on on Thursday afternoon, while on her way to Halifax. The vessel was formerly used in the passenger trade between Chatham and Detroit.

The tugs Frontenac and Johnson, of the Donnelly Wrecking Company, left for the scene on Friday morning to render assistance.

A heavy wind blew down the lake all Thursday afternoon, and increased so much in velocity during the night that about half a dozen boats were obliged to lay up in this vicinity.

The steamer Sarnor arrived from Montreal at noon on Thursday, but laid up until Friday morning before clearing for Lake Erie.

The steamer Warren and barge cleared for the Welland canal.

The steamer Jex arrived in port from Charlotte, with coal for Robert Crawford.

M.T. Co's bulletin: The steamer Westerner passed light, from Montreal to Kingston, with one light barge; the tug Whalen is due up today, with one light barge; the tug Magnolia is due to arrive with two light barges from Montreal.

It was expected that a number of vessels which have been tied up in port on account of the stormy weather, would clear to-day. The steamer City of Dresden is bound for Bath and the steamers Waffle and John Randall for Oswego.

LABOR JOTTINGS.

Activities of the Men Who Turn the Wheel of Industry.

Still another union has been added to the score that have been organized in Kingston during the year. Through the instrumentality of W. Baxter, local representative of the American Federation of Labor, a number of musicians in the city have been organized. A meeting was held a few nights ago and the whole question was discussed. The result was an application for a branch to be formed in Kingston, and the request for a charter has been forwarded to headquarters. It is chiefly the members of the G. W. V. A. band who have so far manifested their interest in the project.

The garage which was built by the members of the local carpenters' union has been sold for \$115. The garage was the object of much interest in the Labor Day parade, and as a result of the efforts of the carpenters \$33 was turned over to the Red Cross Society.

HOME FROM OTTAWA FAIR.

R. J. Bushell Secured Great Mare American to Give Exhibition Here.

R. J. Bushell, the bustling manager of the Kingston Industrial Fair, is home from Ottawa, where he spent a couple of days seeing the sights at the exhibition, and also securing tips for his own fair.

Mr. Bushell had a most important announcement to make, in that he has secured the mare American, owned by Jette, and which has made such a sensation at the Ottawa fair. This will be an entirely new attraction for Kingston. The mare puts on an exhibition which has not been seen any place outside of Ottawa. She races another horse without sulky or driver in record-breaking time.
