

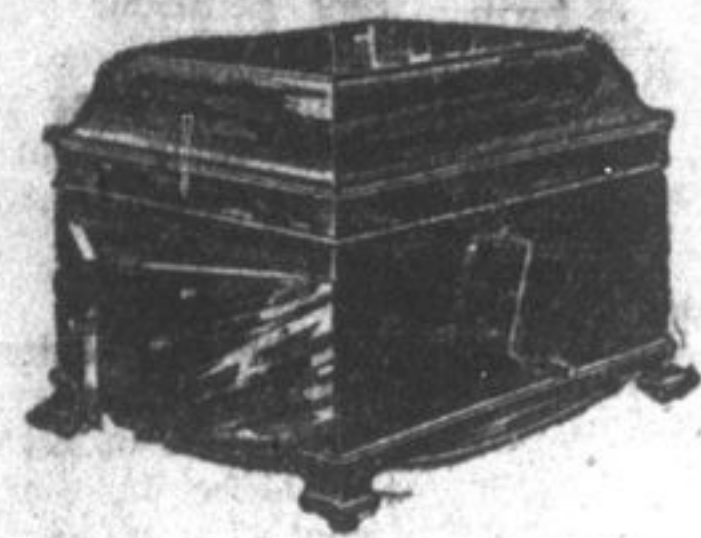

ENGINEER WAS DROWNED INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

HE WAS WASHED OFF THE TUG S. O. DIXON.

Accident Occurred in Lake Ontario Near the Ducks—An Unavailing Search Made For the Body.

In the terrific windstorm on Sunday morning at three o'clock William Watts, engineer on the tug S. O. Dixon, was washed overboard about five miles from the Ducks, and despite a search which lasted until long after daybreak, no trace of his body could be found. The tug, with the barges Louisa and Levee, loaded with molasses and bound for Belleville, had cleared from Oswego on Saturday night after taking refuge in that port for several days from the storm. When some hours out from Oswego a heavy wind came up and by three o'clock there was a hurricane. Some difficulty was experienced in the fire-hold with the water injection and Engineer Watts went in to see what was wrong.

It was while he was making the return from the firehold to the engine-room that he was washed overboard. The fireman, Joseph Williams, who had shipped at Oswego, saw him toppling over when the tug lurched to one side. He endeavored to save him and managed to secure a hold on one of his legs. He called for help, but before it could reach him he had been forced to loose his hold and the engineer was carried off in the fury of the storm.

Capt. William Ziem, of Detroit, heard the cries of Fireman Williams for assistance while he was in the pilot house. Speaking to the Whig on Monday morning, the captain said: "When I heard Williams yelling I dashed to the engine-room and shut off the power. I dared not reverse the boat, as I was afraid that Watts might be caught under the wheel at the stern. I had life belts on the men and also a couple of outer doors that were lying on the decks in the hope that Watts would manage to take hold of them. I blew the distress signals to the barges behind and then yelled to them that there was a man overboard. I ordered life boats to be released and when they were lowered from the rigging I saw that they were on a trace of him. Meanwhile the tugs had got swept around in the wind as the tug had no power on and the lines were very confused. We tried to fix things up but were unsuccessful. We had no regular engineer on board and I did not do the best I could with the power."

Later, when it was found that power could not be kept up, the steamer Keyvise was hailed and the tug and the barges were towed to Kingston. On Monday they were laid up in the slip between the machine shop of the Canadian Locomotive Company and the elevator of Forwarders' Limited. The boats were tangled up and under the supervision of Capt. Ziem the ropes were being straightened out. Each of the barges is well loaded with molasses, which has been consigned from the Sugar Products Company in New York to Belleville. The trip was made through the New York state canal and thence to Kingston.

The late William Watts was about fifty-five years of age and was taken on at Detroit. Capt. Ziem, who formerly lived in Alplino, Mich., but latterly in Detroit, knew very little about the affairs of the deceased, but stated that he understood that his wife died several years ago and that he left no family.

STILL ON STRIKE.

Shipbuilding Workers Have Not Yet Returned to Work.

The members of the Iron Workers, Shipbuilders and Helpers' Union, who walked out on Friday, have not yet returned to work. Things were very quiet at the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company's plant on Monday morning and the union members could be seen discussing the situation on the street corners in little groups. Both the men and the company refuse to speak for publication. One of the rumors in circulation on Sunday night was that the ironworkers in the Canadian Locomotive Works, who are members of the union, would walk out on Monday morning. Up to noon, however, there had been no notification of such action. It is understood that the union organizer was in the city from Quebec over the week-end but what his mission was could not be learned.
