 The Design is Distinctive—Beautiful Piece of Work.
 The Lockett shoe shop front has been finished and adds greatly to the beauty of Princess street. The front was designed by the H. J. St. Clair Company, East Set Windows, Toronto. The work of erection was executed by John King, contractor, under the supervision of a representative of the company who was sent from Toronto.

The design is unusually distinctive as there is no store exactly like it in Canada. The entrance is in the centre, the two sides being utilized as show cases, having dome ceilings and finished throughout in mahogany.

This action was the result of a conference with a representative of the Dominion Fuel Controller who visited the city this week to investigate local conditions. William Baxter reported on the conference with the Government officials and it was clearly evident to all that a fuel commissioner for the city is absolutely necessary at once.
