Various Shows Are Under Able Management of Messrs. Weeks and Farley—A Variety of Good Things For the Visitors.

The Double Bodied Man.

One of the strongest attractions on the Midway is that of Jean Libbera, the double-bodied man. Then there is Bonita, "The smallest biggest lady in the world." Her height is forty-two inches and she weighs 350 pounds. She is a clever entertainer and keeps her audience in roars of laughter, with her funny jokes and antics. She travelled all over the world with Barnum and Ringlin Bros.

Also on exhibit is Tiny, the smallest horse in the world, in height, 26 inches and weighing forty-two pounds. Tiny is five years old. This is an attraction that appeals particularly to the children, and should not be overlooked. Tiny is the children's delight and the pet of the ladies.

Matthew's Tango Girls.

High class vaudeville is a feature of the show put on by the tango

girls. It is a show of real merit, with a most pleasing programme of singing and dancing by a bevy of pretty girls. The show also carries a number of clever comedians. It is a classy show for classy people. Don't overlook this show for it's a hummer.

The British Chemical Company at Trenton is purchasing residents about the town for their experts. Already about \$50,000 worth of property has been secured.

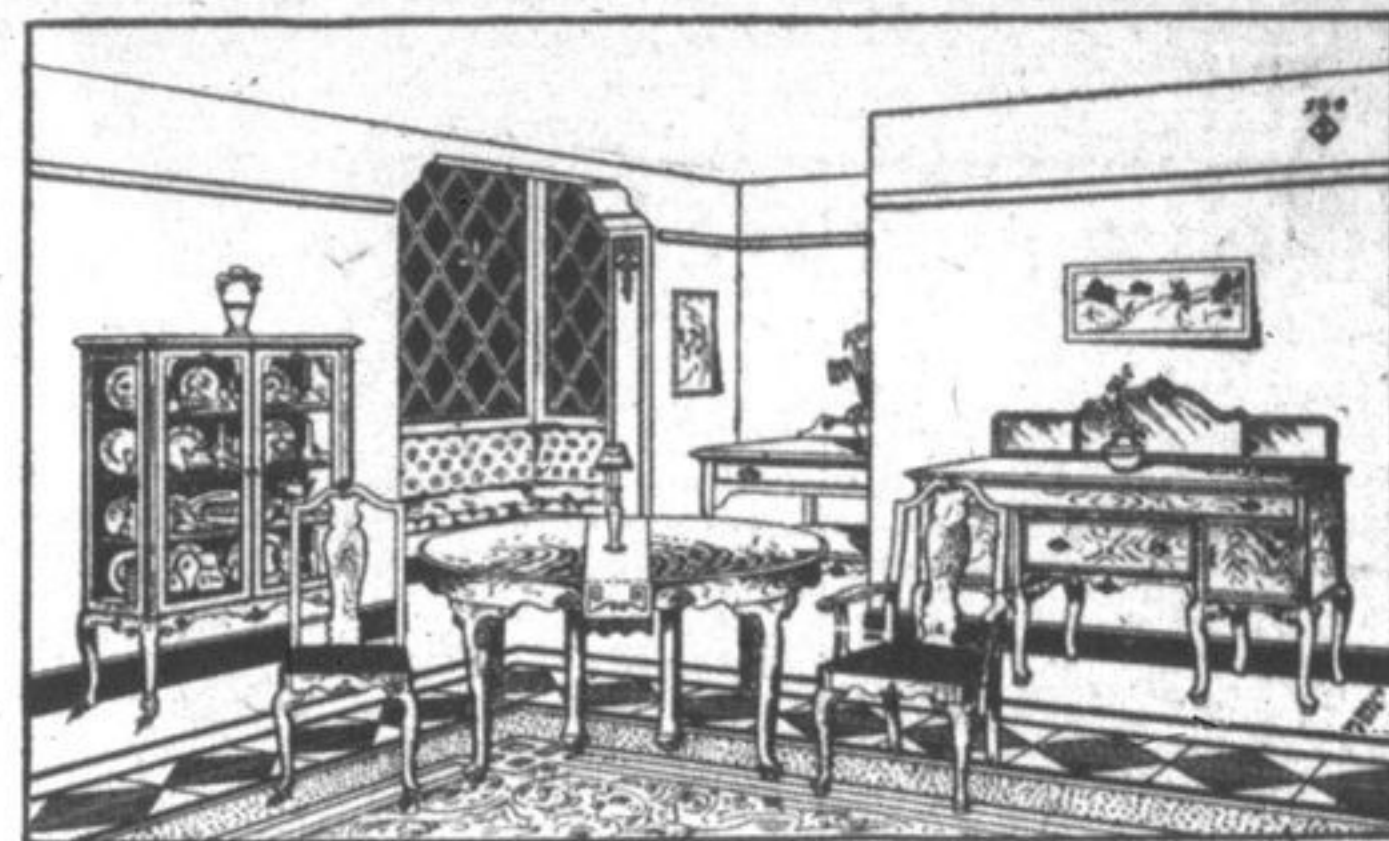
