**Masons Not Asking More Pay.**  
A representative of the Bricklayers, Masons and Plasters Union called at the Whig office today to deny the report in circulation in regard to members of this union demanding one dollar an hour. He said that while it was true that the building season was so short for the bricklayers and masons, and that they usually got from 10 to 15c an hour more than the other mechanics in the building trade the union had an agreement with the contractors signed on April 1st 1918, and one clause in that agreement called for three months' notice to be given by either party if any alteration was made. As no such notice had been given or received, he thought there would be no change this year.

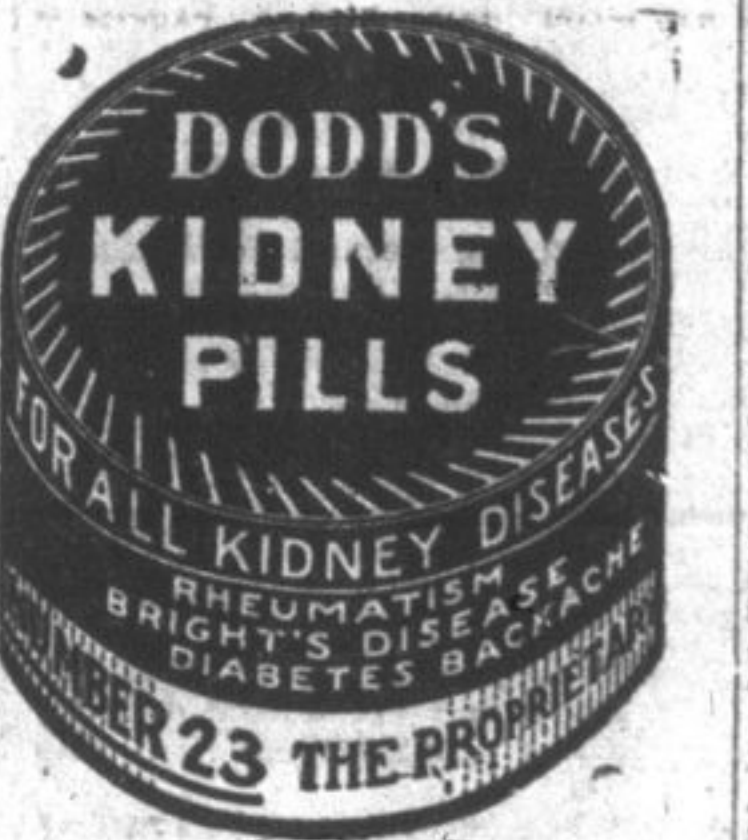
