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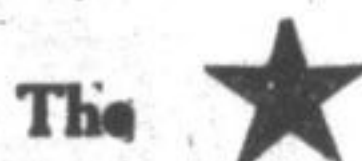

THE KAISER FORGETS IN MAKING REBUKE

Germans Bombed undefended Places—British Bomb Defended German Places.

London, Sept. 27.—His Majesty the Kaiser and King, deeply sympathizes in the misfortune which had befallen the open town of Frankfurt, as a result of the enemy air attack which is contrary to international law.

Thus the Kaiser's telegram in respect to Frankfurt, which was hotly defended by anti-aircraft guns and airplanes on the occasion of a recent attack by the R. A. F. Independent Force upon its munition factories and railway junctions.

After all these years of bombing the Kaiser professes anger and sympathy. But it was the Kaiser's own Zepplins which attacked the literally "open" and quite defenseless English town of Hull on the night of March 5-6, 1916, and the story of the raid may be recalled to him since he now poses as an offended authority on international law. The bombing of defenseless civilians was then still a new thing in the world, a demonstration of the Kaiser's kultur for which nobody had been prepared.

Hull was completely undefended; Frankfurt was completely defended. Bombs were rained broadcast at Hull; at Frankfurt the Independent Force of the R. A. F., as always, picked out targets which were legitimately military objectives. Their raid was not a reprisal, either in the punitive or preventive sense. It was a military raid on military establishments.
