Let music take its place side by side with spelling, reading and arithmetic. 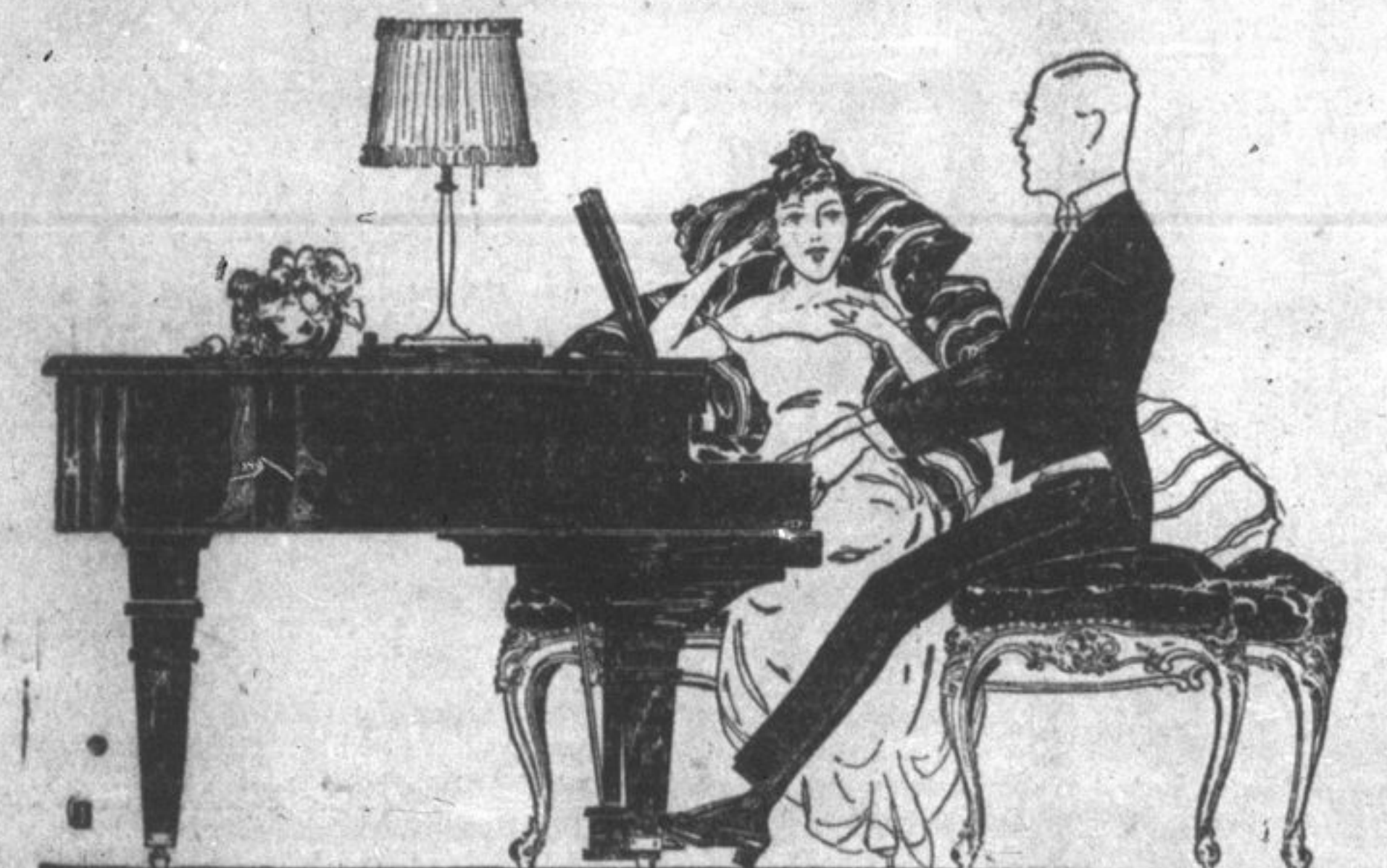

WAR HERO MARRIED.

Schnyer Smith Takes Lily May Snider as His Bride. The marriage took place on Wednesday morning at eleven o'clock at Queen Street Methodist church parsonage, Rev. J. D. Ellis officiating, of Miss Lily May Snider, of Yarker, and Schnyer Smith, of Loxborough.

The groom served in France for a year and went through the fighting at Passchendaele. Two of his companions were shot at his side by snipers, and he himself was shot later. A bullet pierced his arm, lung and shoulder blade, and he lay for thirty-six hours before being removed, and was conscious practically all the time. He went through this experience eleven months ago, but has completely recovered from his injuries.
