CCORDIING to the dictionary, the word shoddy was used originally to denote waste stuff shed or thrown off, the fluffy, fibrous waste from wool carding, worsted spinning or weaving of woollens. Then it came to mean a fibrous material, obtained

Later the word shoddy was used to indicate a cloth of inferior quality; 'made of or containing a large proportion of shoddy, and from that it has acquired its common inferiority, sham and pretense. Because of this use of the term, many persons have a wrong idea of what worked wool, to avoid the term that has fallen into disrepute, is really an excellent and useful article.
