The Allied forces yesterday to the north of St. Quentin, and forty guns were captured there. British forces have entered northern suburbs of Cambrai.

Breaking German Hold.

Paris, Sept. 30.—Progress in breaking the hold of the German invader on French soil is shown by the fact that no longer is any of the French departments entirely occupied by the enemy. This situation was established by the recapture of four communes of the department of the Ardennes.

The British Official Statement.

London, Sept. 30.—In operations yesterday north of St. Quentin the Midland division alone took 400 prisoners and forty guns. Between Belloucourt and Gonnelleux the enemy resistance yesterday was obstinate. American, Australian and English troops had heavy fighting until late in the evening.

Belgians Nearing Roulers.

Brussels, Sept. 30.—The Belgian official statement says: The Messines-Wytschaete ridge has been occupied and the Germans have been defeated in efforts to defend the approaches to the river Lys. British and Belgian troops on Saturday and Sunday took more than 9,000 prisoners. They also captured more than 200 guns, some of heavy calibre, as well as a very considerable quantity of other war material.

Fall of Cambrai Imminent.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

London, Sept. 30.—(1.45 p.m.)—Pushing the Germans hard on the front north of the Aisne, the French to-day have reached the Oise-Aisne canal. Reports from the battle front show they are progressing along the Chemin des Dames toward the east and the enemy is retreating behind the Ailette.

Shoddy and What It Is

ACCORDING to the dictionary, the word shoddy was used originally to denote waste stuff shed or thrown off, the fluffy, fibrous waste from wool carding, worsted spinning or weaving of woollens. Then it came to mean a fibrous material, obtained by deviling or tearing into fibres refuse woollen goods—old stockings, rugs, druggets, etc.; and the same term was often applied to the material obtained from old cotton goods. Later the word shoddy was used to indicate a cloth of inferior quality, made of or containing a large proportion of shoddy, and from that it has acquired its common or colloquial use as a term signifying inferiority, sham and pretence.
