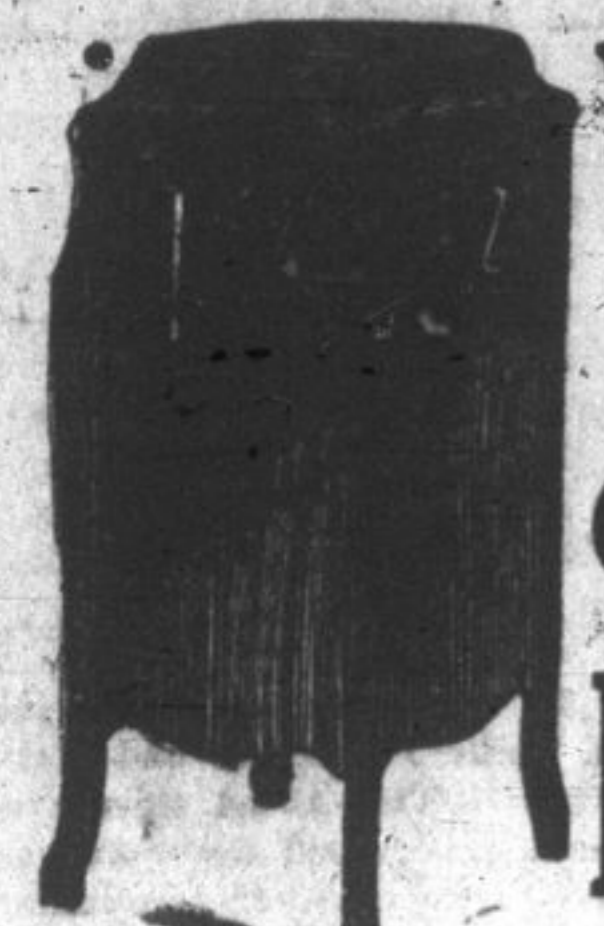

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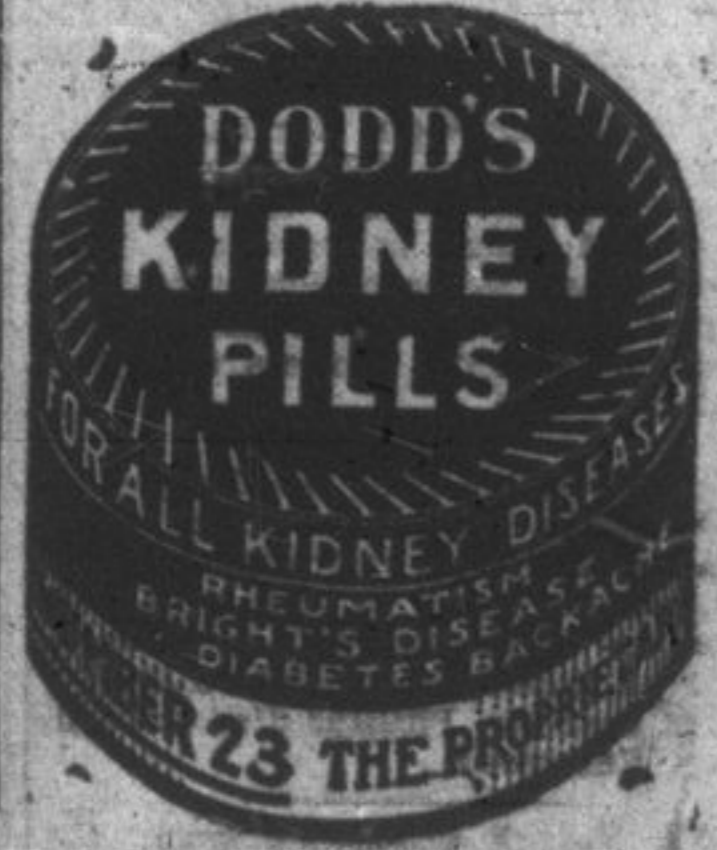

THE GREAT WAR VETERANS

HELD THEIR REGULAR MEETING ON MONDAY EVENING.

Sergt.-Major E. J. Allen Resigned From Executive, as He Is Being Transferred to Cobourg.
 The weekly meeting of the Great War Veterans' Association was held Monday evening, C. W. Topping, first vice-president, occupying the chair, in the absence of Petawawa Camp of the president, Lieut.-Col. R. Crocker.
 It was moved by Comrades Bowker and Allen that business be suspended to nominate a committee of three to represent the G. W. V. A. at a special meeting of the City Council on the question of appointing a fuel controller. Comrades Bowker, Allen and Hicks were nominated, and the meeting for that purpose. On their return Comrade Bowker reported that a commissioner will be appointed at the next meeting of the council.

SPANISH "FLU" IS NOT PREVALENT HERE

It is Believed That There is More Typhoid Than Influenza.

The prevalence of Spanish influenza, or Spanish "flu," as it is more commonly known, in the United States, has caused some alarm in the city. Only a few days ago the American Government laid aside one million dollars to fight the epidemic, but it is fortunate that in Canada it is comparatively unknown.
 Many persons who have suffered colds during the past ten days owing to the change in the weather have been under the impression that they have been attacked by Spanish influenza. A well-known specialist stated on Tuesday morning that he did not believe that such was the case, as the symptoms of the illness he noted were not felt by the patient to know that there should be any apprehension as to the alleged prevalence of the ailment.
