

Y.M.C.A. WORK OVERSEAS
CAPT. T. F. BEST SPOKE ABOUT SERVICE WITH THE TROOPS.
 "Y" Takes a Big Place at the Temporary Camps—Work is Essential to Well Being of the Men.
 Interesting letters have been received in the city from Capt. T. F. Best, now overseas, who was engaged in Y.M.C.A. work in Kingston. He speaks of the voyage over, it being filled with interest as well as danger. The chaplains and the Y.M.C.A. have a magnificent opportunity for service with the troops.
 "Personally, I seldom have known my messages more enthusiastically received than by those two thousand Sammys," remarked the writer. "They are a fine lot of soldiers, full of health and pep. It was an inspiring sight to see them landing off fifteen transports thirty-four thousand strong."
 Capt. Best states that the Y. M. C. A. is doing a wonderful piece of work in London alone.
 In the temporary summer camps the "Y" takes a big place in the hearts of the men of all ranks, for its work is really essential to the well being of the troops. In these aggregation camps particularly this work is appreciated the more, because the men are not allowed out owing to contagious diseases being among them. Consequently athletics are popular; contents and reading rooms, correspondence tents, concerts, lectures and religious meetings are all crowded.

A DELIGHTFUL CONCERT

BARGE MUSKOKA SAFE; PICKED UP BY TUG

 The steamer Belleville arrived from Toronto at 5 a.m. and cleared for Montreal at 6.20 a.m. on Wednesday.


