"WE ARE BETRAYED," CRIES GERMAN PRESS

Which Only Now Publishes the News of Bulgaria's Unconditional Surrender.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Amsterdam, Oct. 3.—The news of Bulgaria's unconditional surrender is now being published in the German press. It was admittedly withheld intentionally from public knowledge for a time, because the German official world refused to credit it until the last moment.

"We are betrayed," is a sentence that consequently appears in newspaper articles. The Frankfurt Gazette is the first to admit that the surrender is the direct consequence of the developments on the western front, and it describes King Ferdinand's reported messages of loyalty to the German and Austrian emperors as constituting "a psychological riddle." The Cologne Volks Zeitung is deeply pessimistic regarding the future. "It would be unwise," it says, "to place any hopes on a counter movement."

TRAIN HITS WORKMEN; OVER TWENTY KILLED.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Cleveland, O., Oct. 3.—More than twenty workmen were killed and that many more were injured this morning when the Pennsylvania flyer smashed into a crowd of workmen. The men were waiting for a work train.

Military News

Application has been made to militia headquarters by the principal of St. John's school, Ossington-Hudson, N.Y., for the services of a well-educated man who has returned from overseas who could take the position of commandant of the school. The personnel of the school numbers some sixty boys. The duties of the applicant would be to take charge of the discipline of the school along military lines, instruct the boys in drill, also teach English and arithmetic if possible. Commanding officers are requested to forward to district headquarters the names of any officer or N.C.O. who they can recommend as suitable for the position.

Left Boston For Kingston to Resume Duties at Queen's.
Lieut.-Col. P. G. C. Campbell, formerly officer commanding the 253rd Queen's University Highlanders, left Boston on Wednesday night for Kingston. Lieut.-Col. Campbell is returning from England, where he took his battalion, which was afterwards disbanded. He will resume his duties as professor of the department of modern languages at Queen's University, after an absence of seventeen months. His wife resides at 57 George street.

Canadian Club Luncheon.

One hundred and twenty-five members of the Canadian Club sat down to a delicious luncheon in the Salvation Army Hostel on Thursday at noon. Judge Lavell, who presided, introduced Bishop Fallon, of London, Ont., to the members, and his Lordship gave a thrilling account of his experiences and observations at the battle front in France, which will be presented in the Friday issue of the Whig.
