### BISHOP FALLON'S STORY

(Continued from Page 3.)  
a German officer who was captured, and when questioned stated that the Germans knew they were bombing hospitals, but that they did so as they were given orders to bomb them. "We would have had our ears pulled if we did not carry out orders," the German officer said.

The speaker visited many of the graveyards overseas, and stated that most pathetic were the poppies growing in the graveyards, and said that not until he viewed these poppies did he realize the full meaning of the late Col. McCrae's lines, "In Flanders Fields."

In his closing remarks His Lordship expressed his kindly feelings for Canada had taken in the war. He declared that for the last quarter of a century he had felt that the principles of civil and religious liberty were in jeopardy. He had this view ever since the days he spent in Germany as a student. At this time there was a feeling in Germany towards wiping the British Empire and her interests off the map of the world.

"We are coming to the end. The war is not yet won, however, and do not let us talk too loudly for fear of being given to the soldiers as wages. Bishop Fallon described the wonderful work of the records in Rouen, where the whole story of any Canadian soldier in France can be obtained in a few minutes. In the year ending June 1st more than two million letters had been re-addressed in that office. There was the same system of co-ordination for parcels for soldiers who had moved from one place to another. What touched him most was the character of the souvenirs of deceased soldiers which were being sent to their parents—rings, watches, prayer books, testaments, hymn books, and other relics. Of the 700 who worked in the records office at Rouen almost all he said were wounded stripes.
