WOMAN NEGLECTS BABES.
 Soldier's Wife Cruelly Ill-Treats Her Children.
 Cornwall, Ont., Oct. 9.—A harrowing case heard in the police court here was that of a charge against Mrs. George Flaro, Lancaster, whose husband is over in France. The woman was charged with neglecting her five children, ranging in age from one to twelve years. By the evidence of citizens of Lancaster, it was established that the children were bootless, stockless, and supplied with the barest clothing possible, even in winter weather in seasons past, and while every chance was given her to make good, no effort at bettering the filthy conditions about her house or for her children was noticeable.
 At Richmond, Ky., James D. McCreaty, twice governor of Kentucky, six years a representative of his state in the U. S. Senate, and for several consecutive terms a member of the Lower House of Congress, died on Tuesday. He was eighty years old.

 Ottawa would like the assistance of some of Kingston's military doctors who are not busy at present to help attend influenza cases.

 Pte. William McLeod, who won the military medal, is a nephew of Mrs. William Moore, Mrs. (Capt.) Corkey and Mrs. Charles Andre, all of this city.
 The Great War Veterans' Association entertained the newly-retained soldiers at a smoker on Tuesday evening. Refreshments were served. James McFarland and George A. McGowan donated the cigars.
 Miss Garland, 185 Upper Colborne street, and Mrs. McCullough, 135 Colborne street, were removed to the General Hospital in James Reid's ambulance on Wednesday.
 Mrs. Clarence S. Duncan, No. 4 Quebec street, left on Wednesday for Metuchen, N.J., where she will spend the winter near her husband, Buster Clarence Duncan, who is stationed at Camp Rantan.
 Lieut.-Col. Mahlon Davis, a graduate of the Royal Military College, died in Ottawa on Tuesday. He was through the war until he met with an accident and was invalided home.
 There are twenty-eight employed in a local wholesale house, and on Wednesday it was reported that out of that number only seven were on the job, the remainder being confined to their homes with illness. The Board of Health was called to meet this afternoon to consider the advisability of closing the schools, the theatres and the churches as a precaution against the spread of influenza. The provincial health officer, Dr. McCullough, Toronto, advises against it.

Death at Bongard's.
 Bongard's, Oct. 8.—The death occurred at Bongard's on Saturday last of James Bradley, aged eighty-two years. Death was due to a complication of diseases. Deceased was a Liberal in politics and a Methodist in religion. He leaves one son and two daughters, W. J. of Chatham; Mrs. W. H. Carahan of Bongard's, and Mrs. E. B. Kempf, of Orleans. The funeral took place on Monday from his late residence to Bongard's church and Glenwood cemetery at Picton. Rev. J. F. Ireland, of Cressy circuit. The pallbearers were I. B. Lucas, R. Harrison, L. Pierce, O. W. Hicks, E. Miller and F. Eaton.
