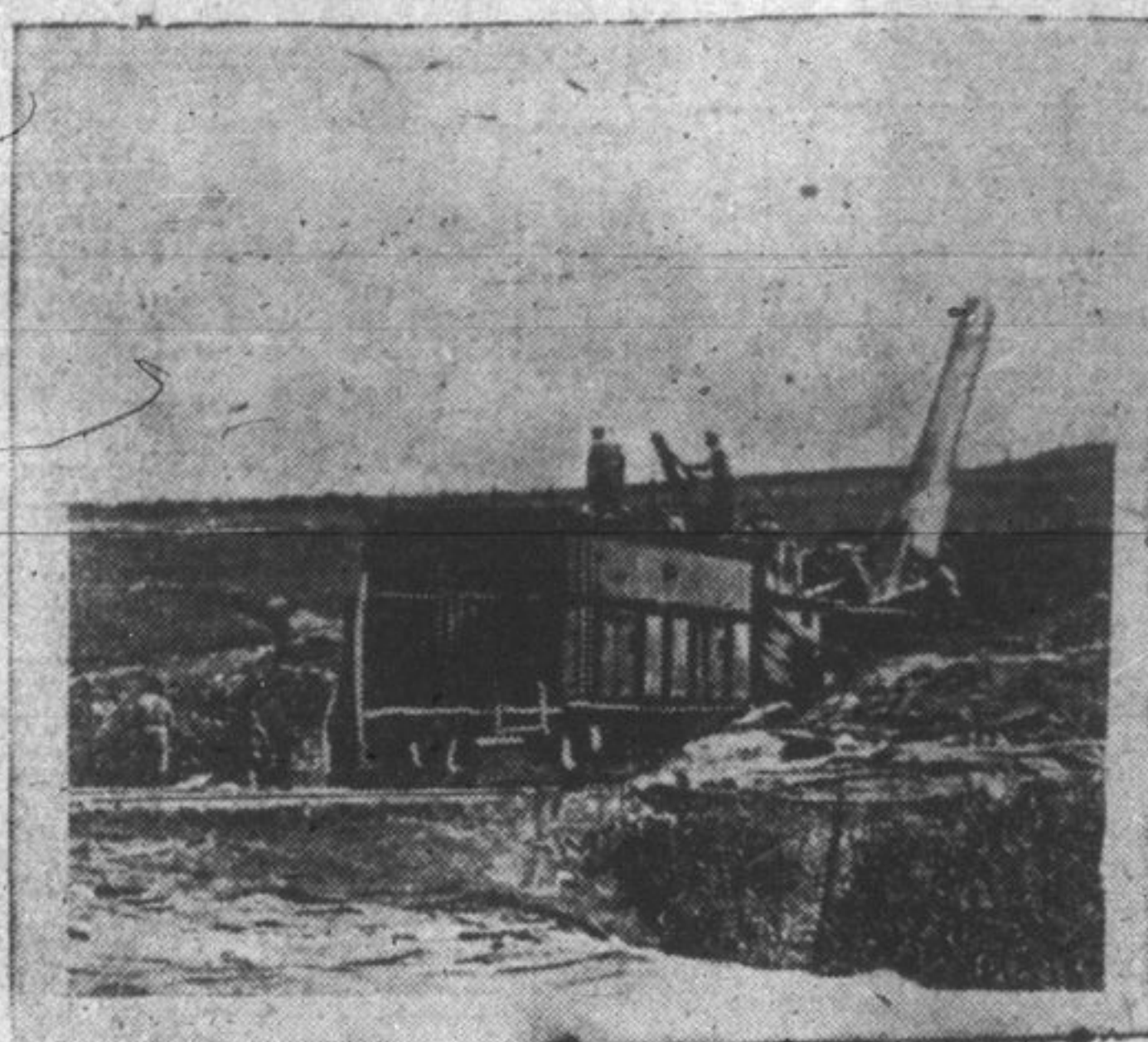

Cards distributed among guests at the Biltmore, Manhattan, Belmont, Murray Hill and Ansonia to-day announced that, beginning to-day, meals will be served only at certain hours, and that persons desiring nourishment after 9 p.m. will have to be satisfied with cold cuts.

TREASON CASE IN PARIS.

An Actress, Her Husband and a Bank Clerk Charged.

Paris, Oct. 9.—Sissy Dussy, a former actress in Sarah Bernhardt's Theatre; Emile Cullier, her husband, who once was manager of Sam McVey, an American pugilist, and Maurice Tremblay, a bank employee and representative of an Austrian named Rosenberg, who was prominent in the Paris Bourse, and whose bank in Switzerland is under sequestration, were placed on trial to-day on a charge of maintaining relations with the enemy. The hearing was secret. The defendants were arrested early in the year. Rosenberg fled to Switzerland at the opening of hostilities. He opened a bank and an information bureau in Zurich in association with another Austrian named Bettehelm, and the charges against the defendants are alleged relations with the enemy through this source.

Pte. William K. Gilbert Hart. Delta, Oct. 9.—A message received by Mrs. Hester Case, contained the information that Pte. William K. Gilbert, of the Canadian Infantry forces, was admitted to No. 4 General Hospital at Camiers, on Sept. 27th, suffering from contusion. Pte. Gilbert enlisted with the 156th Battalion and had been in France for some time. He was previously gassed and wounded.
