### ARE HOME FROM OVERSEAS

ABOUT FOUR HUNDRED MEN CAME IN THURSDAY.

Reached City Without a Civic Welcome—Authorities Again Asked to Notify the City.

Upwards of four nundred returned men arrived in the city shortly before 9 o'clock on Thursday morning. The men for the most part belong to the Ottawa-Kingston district, and during the day were issued transportation to their homes. They were a happy lot very anxious to get to their homes Many of the boys who returned Thursday morning had been overseas three and four years. Many were lame, and nearly all had battle scars to show the part they played in chas ing the Huns.

Pte. Patrick Donnelly, of Arnprior, Served With the 21st Battalion.

Pte. Patrick Donnelly will arrive in Kingston in the course of a few days to undergo treatment. His home is in Arnprior. Pte. Donnelly lost his right arm at the front. He enlisted in July, 1916, in the 240th Battalion. and was later transferred to the 21st Battalion.
