### ARE NOT TO BE CLOSED

THEATRES, SCHOOLS AND CHURCHES TO CONTINUE OPEN.

The Board of Health Does Not Consider It Necessary to Close Them—The People Are Taking Precautions Against Influenza.

That there is no need at the present time to close up the theatres, churches or other places, but urging that all the necessary precautions be taken to stamp out the epidemic of Spanish influenza, and that citizens themselves take all the necessary precautions to stop the spread of the disease, was the outcome of the special meeting of the Board of Health, which was held on Wednesday afternoon, to deal with the matter. The medical health officer, Dr. A. R. B. Williamson, was requested by the Board to write a letter to the press, in which he will present the situation to the citizens. The letter of Dr. Williamson appears elsewhere in this issue.

Dr. J. W. S. McCullough, provincial medical health officer, in a letter issued to local health officers, pointed out that the closing of schools, theatres and churches, would not affect the epidemic while trains, street cars and restaurants were in operation. There was very much danger from the using of table utensils in restaurants.

Dr. Williamson reported that there were quite a number of cases of Spanish influenza in the city. Just how many he could not say, as it was not a reportable disease, and no returns were made to him. However, it was his desire to have the meeting to decide on whether or not any of the public places would be closed. He read a statement issued by Dr. McCullough, in which he was opposed to the closing of schools, theatres, and churches for the reason already mentioned.

Mayor Hughes, who was in Toronto on Tuesday and Wednesday, remarked that the Board of Health had not closed up any place there.

The members felt that they should be guided by the provincial health officer to a large extent and in addition to having Dr. Williamson write a letter, it was decided to ask that all public places be thoroughly disinfected. It was pointed out by Dr. Williamson that the bright, warm weather would do much to kill the disease. September was so cold and wet that the disease made great headway.

It was reported that the Grand Opera House had been well-ventilated and disinfected.

In connection with the schools it was reported that the children were being well instructed as to the ways and means of preventing the spread of the disease. The teachers are co-operating with the school nurse, and a close tab is being kept on the pupils and if they show any symptoms of the disease are sent home immediately.

The members went into the matter thoroughly and came to the conclusion that it would not be necessary to close up any places and thus hurt business and especially in view of the statement of the Provincial Medical Health Officer.

Those present at the meeting were Mayor Hughes, who presided, Dr. G. W. Bell and Messrs. Cain, Sharpe and Dr. Williamson.

### KILLED IN ACTION

A Former Kingstonian Paid Supreme Sacrifice on Sept. 2nd.

Word has been received by Mr. and Mrs. Ira Burch, 299 Simcoe street, London, Ont., formerly of Kingston, that their son, Pte. Ira J. Burch, was killed in action on Sept. 2nd. Pte. Burch left London with the W.O.R. Battalion early in March and later was transferred to the machine gun section. Prior to enlisting he was employed by the Hydro-Electric Power Company.

A quiet wedding took place at St. Anthony's church, Centreville, on Oct. 7th, when Miss Sarah Teresa Breault and Edmond Harpell, Catarqui, were united in marriage by Rev. Father McCarthy.
