In keeping with the policy of the United Kingdom, The United States and Canada have taken the opposite course. The question now is, when will these two opposite sides come together in a common policy, and which will change?

FURNISHING WORKING CAPITAL.

Our Victory loans are really furnishing the working capital of the nation during the period of the war. They have also created the investment moneys which have subscribed our provincial and municipal issues. These amounted during the last year to sixty million dollars. Apart from patriotic grounds it is the direct, immediate personal interest of every citizen of Canada to contribute to the Victory loan. Its success means five hundred million dollars of new business for Canada. How does Great Britain repay us for these vast credits which we are extending to her for the purchase of grain, foodstuffs, ammunition, and other supplies in Canada? In great measure by lending us in London the funds required to maintain our reserves in England and our forces in France. We do not send gold abroad for this purpose or buy sterling exchange. We extend credits to Britain here to purchase our products. Britain extends credits to us in England to pay our war-expenditure abroad. The balance of accounts is to-day in our favor to an amount considerably exceeding one hundred million dollars.

FIGHTING CHAPLAINS.

It is no anaemic or solemn-faced religion that the chaplain of to-day preaches at the front or in the camps. In fact he can be said not to preach at all. He practices. The minister of religion who has donned khaki in order to help his country win the war is a good type of the whole-hearted, manly soul who would as soon crack a joke to cheer a soldier as crack an enemy over the head to save a soldier. Whether a Protestant or a Catholic, he is first of all a minister to the good and wholesome spirits of the troops and only afterwards a minister of the practices and observances which we have learned to know by the name of religion.

Like the Y.M.C.A. worker and his colleague of the Catholic welfare organizations, the chaplains of all denominations and religions realized very early in the war that there is enough solemnity, enough familiarity with compelling and awesome facts in the life of the soldier. With true instincts, he set before himself the task of lightening the burden, of giving the wholesome, human touch, of offering the services, not of a spiritual leader as such, but of a guide, philosopher and friend to the fighting man.

The new spirit and the new appreciation of values which thousands of pastors and preachers will attain during the war will exert a profound effect upon the religious life of the country after the war. We will have a more cheerful religion, and none the less effective and deeply permeating on that account.

CANADA AND CAMBRAI.

After being four years in the war, Canada's army in France is still going strong, and was never more efficient or full of fight as in these autumn days of 1918. Foch knew what he was doing when he selected the Canadians to break the Hindenburg line on its northern end.

The Allied commander-in-chief knew that the very pick of the troops at his disposal must be sent forth to tackle that difficult task, and so he selected Currie's divisions from the land of the maple leaf, and Johnny Canuck lived up to his reputation and promptly smashed the line at that point to smithereens, so that Foch's plans might not be delayed.

After a rest, the Canadians were sent back to give the old line another crack, and they kept up their hammer blows. When it came time to rush Cambrai, the Canadians were there "with bells on," and had

the honor of driving the Germans from this French city, whose capture was so nearly effected one year ago by Marshal Haig.

Again the Canadians have proven that they have no peers as fighters. Their record is glorious and their fame imperishable. Canada salutes her sons in old France, fighting for the freedom of mankind.

THE PLATOON SYSTEM.

Following the introduction of the platoon system in Toronto and other cities, a movement is now on foot to bring the Kingston Fire Department into line. Alone among all the employees of the city, the firemen have no regular alternation of their hours of duty. With the exception of a brief annual holiday and a few hours off in the evening every fifth day, they are continuously on service. They have no opportunity to enjoy home life as it is known to the rest of the citizens. The long hours of duty have caused dissatisfaction here, as they have in other cities, and the firemen believe that the time has come when some consideration should be shown them. A re-arrangement of their hours could be made, according to a report presented to and adopted by the Fire and Light Committee, without adding to the strength of the force or increasing its cost. It is proposed that, beginning on Dec. 1st or earlier, the department should be divided into two shifts, one for night and one for day, alternating each fortnight. Each shift would consist of nine men and the
