Called to England.

Brockville, Oct. 12.—Rev. Albert H. Turkey Expects Bulgar Invasion.

London, Oct. 12.—The Porte has been advised that Bulgaria is expected to send troops against Turkey in an expedition planned by the Entente Allies, according to a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Amsterdam, quoting advices from Constantinople, the despatch adds. Corporal Joseph Blair Was Killed in Action. Catarauqui, Oct. 10.—There is quite a number of people affected with colds in the village. She was well known here as May Ely being born and brought up here. She spent the most of her married life in Cloyne, returning here but three months ago. She was just in the hospital a week suffering from pneumonia. Deceased leaves two little girls, one a baby six weeks old. Much sympathy is felt for her husband and her mother, Mrs. B. Kish. Mrs. Rankin and her sister, Miss Mary Porter, a graduate nurse in town, are calling on old acquaintances here. John G. McCroney, Govt. Clerk, Sunnyside, a son. The war workers are getting Christmas gifts ready for the boys overseas. Mrs. J. Ward is home again. Word has just been received here that Corp. Joseph Blair, son of Mrs. J. Blair, has given his life for his country while on active service in France. He had been over two years in the trenches, and had won promotion by his courage and daring.

THE BIG OFFENSIVE.

Major McParland Writes That It Has Been Wonderful. Writing to his mother, Mrs. James McParland, from France under date of Sept. 7th, Major Fred McParland, of Kingston, writes: "I told you in my last letter that I got back to France in time for the big offensive, and it has been a wonderful month for me; in fact wonderful for every one in the corps. We have been on the move all the time, going ahead mostly or moving to a new part of the line, but never going back. We are in territory now that the Allies have not trod on since 1915, which makes it even more interesting to us. From my headquarters I can see the towers of a city which is much talked of in the papers, and which is one of the main objectives in the big advance. I cannot tell you all the interesting happenings of the shows we have been through, as the censor would not like it. However, you will see by the papers what we have accomplished, and it has been more than a little. What the papers tell you is about the truth, and I am certainly glad that I have been through these two shows, as they have been by far the biggest things the corps has done since the Canadians arrived in France. "Just at present I am commanding a 'group,' which is a larger command than a brigade, so takes up more of my time than if I just had my own brigade."

Germany Asked Peace to Forestall Her Allies.

Amsterdam, Oct. 12.—The Frankfort Zeitung, in explaining to its readers the reason why Germany asked for peace, says: "After Bulgaria's collapse Austria-Hungary resolved to approach President Wilson with an offer of an armistice for the purpose of bringing about peace negotiations. At the same time a similar step was being prepared in Turkey. Germany thereupon decided to join the movement, and Chancellor Maximilian made his appeal to President Wilson. Emperor William, in thanking the German industrial association for its vote of confidence, is quoted by the Cologne Gazette as saying: "The hour has come when we are fighting for the future of the Fatherland and for the protection of the soil of the homeland. To that end we need the united action of the intellectual, moral and economic powers of Germany. On the co-operation of these powers our invincibility rests. "The will for defence must bind all separate views and separate wishes into one great unity of conception. God grant us something of the spirit of the war of liberation."

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FOUND A SCHOLARSHIP.

As Queen's in Memory of Late Eric Horsey May. Dr. Herbert Horsey, acting for the executors of the late Henry M. Horsey, of Ottawa, has advised Queen's University of the founding of a scholarship of the value of \$100 a year in memory of the late Eric Horsey May, an undergraduate of the university, who died of wounds at Rouen, France, August 22nd, 1918. The scholarship is to be awarded to the student from the Ottawa Collegiate Institute who obtains the highest aggregate standing at the honor matriculation examinations, and is available for any faculty of the university.

KILLED IN ACTION.

Pte. Elmer Shepherd, Formerly of Inverary, Has Fallen. Mrs. Shepherd, of the Albion Hotel, has been officially notified that her husband, Pte. Elmer Shepherd, was killed in action on the 27th of September. He belonged to Inverary, and enlisted with the 146th Battalion.

TURKEY APPROACHES U.S.

With Peace Proposal—Wilson's Terms Are Acceptable. (Canadian Press Despatch) London, Oct. 12.—Reuter's Limited says it learns Turkey has approached the United States with a definite proposal of peace. Austria-Hungary and Turkey have informed Germany they will accept Wilson's peace terms.
