In the World of Sport

Don'ts For Gunners.

Every year the hunting season brings with it its spoils in the form of human sacrifices. For the benefit of gunners who are going after game this fall the following list of don'ts is given:

Don't take any chances. The function of a shotgun is to scatter shot, but be very careful where you scatter it.

Don't blaze away in haste and don't get excited. Many a shooter has filled his favorite dog full of lead just because he was over-anxious.

Don't point a gun at any person in jest. It is always the gun that "we didn't know was loaded" that goes off and does the damage. The only time to point a gun is when you intend to kill.

Don't take every rustle of a bush or a bough to be a sure indication of game. Remember sometimes an inquisitive person has a penchant for being in strange places.

Don't carry a loaded gun through the street or on cars, trains, automobiles or any other kind of vehicle.

Don't get excited and shoot without making sure your object is game. Don't shoot until you see the rabbit, and then be sure that he is clear of both man and dog.

Don't drag a gun under a fence with the muzzle pointed toward you. Don't climb over fences with your gun or lean it against a tree until you get over. Put it through the fence and on the ground, business end before.

Don't hunt with anyone that you know to be careless. Carelessness with three-and-a-quarter drams of powder behind and one and one-eighth ounces of shot is inviting "sure death."

Don't load your gun until you are actually ready for business. At all other times it should be empty. Keep your finger off the trigger until you are looking down the barrel at your game.

Don't rest on the muzzle of your gun. Don't violate the game laws. It is not only criminal but sometimes very costly.

Don't "hog" all the game. Leave some for the next fellow.

Don't rest the muzzle of your gun on the ground. A gun muzzle clogged with dirt or mud is a dangerous weapon.

MAY USE MAJOR PARKS.

Government Approves of Plan for Week-end Baseball.

The U. S. Government has approved the plan of the National Baseball Federation to form a semi-professional league to play in major league parks on Saturdays and Sundays next season.

The league will be comprised of teams representing eight cities, including Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and Akron. The remaining two are yet to be selected. Each city will have at least two clubs, one remaining at home while the other is on the road. After travelling expenses and the up-keep of the parks have been deducted the receipts will go to the national commission on training camp activities for athletic equipment for soldiers and sailors.

Olympic Champ, Beaten.

At the sports held by the Lee Training Centre of the Army Service Corps last month, much interest centred in the appearance of the South African Olympic sprint champion of 1908, Lance-Corporal Reggie Walker, who took part in the furlong handicap. In this he owed a couple of yards, Pte. Aggersburg, R.A.F., being the actual scratch man, with half a yard less, and though the crack Colonial ran well in winning his heat in 25.25 seconds, he could not negotiate an awkward bend into the straight in the final, and never looked like catching an A. S. P. representative, Pte. Seddon, who won in 23.45 seconds off the 14 yards mark.

Racing in Bagdad City.

A corporal of the R. A. M. C., serving with the forces in the East, writing to the Yorkshire Evening Post, tells an interesting story of a race meeting held at Bagdad on March 16th, in connection with a week's festivities arranged to commemorate the fall of that historic city. Frank Wootton is stated to have ridden the winner of the "Bagdad Grand National," for which there were twenty-eight entries, but in three-quarters of a mile race, on a horse named Kiki, he failed to get placed.—London Sportsman.

Cubs Given Time to Pay.

The owners of the San Francisco Seals have granted an extension of time to the Chicago Cubs on the purchase of Charles Pick. Instead of the \$4,500 being due next Wednesday, it is not due until December 1st. Pick was formerly a member of the Toronto Leafs, and was one of the most valuable members of the Cubs' team in the recent world series.

Hockey Leagues Bidding for Ice. The competition for ice for next winter has begun at Montreal between the N. H. L. clubs and the rival organization. The proprietors of the Jubilee Rink have received offers from both parties, the new league magnates doubling the quotation of the old league clubs.

Jockeys Are Hun Victims.

In the casualties which the American army has already suffered in France appear the names of five well known amateur jockeys who have made the supreme sacrifice. They are "Dick" Mortimer, A. P. Humphrey, Norman Price, David Bisphan and B. B. Lewis.—London Sportsman.

Boston Has Old Clubs.

Boston has two of the oldest clubs in the world. In bicycling the Boston Bicycle Club ranks next to the Pickwick Club of London in age, and so the Boston Chess Club ranks next to the City of London Chess Club.

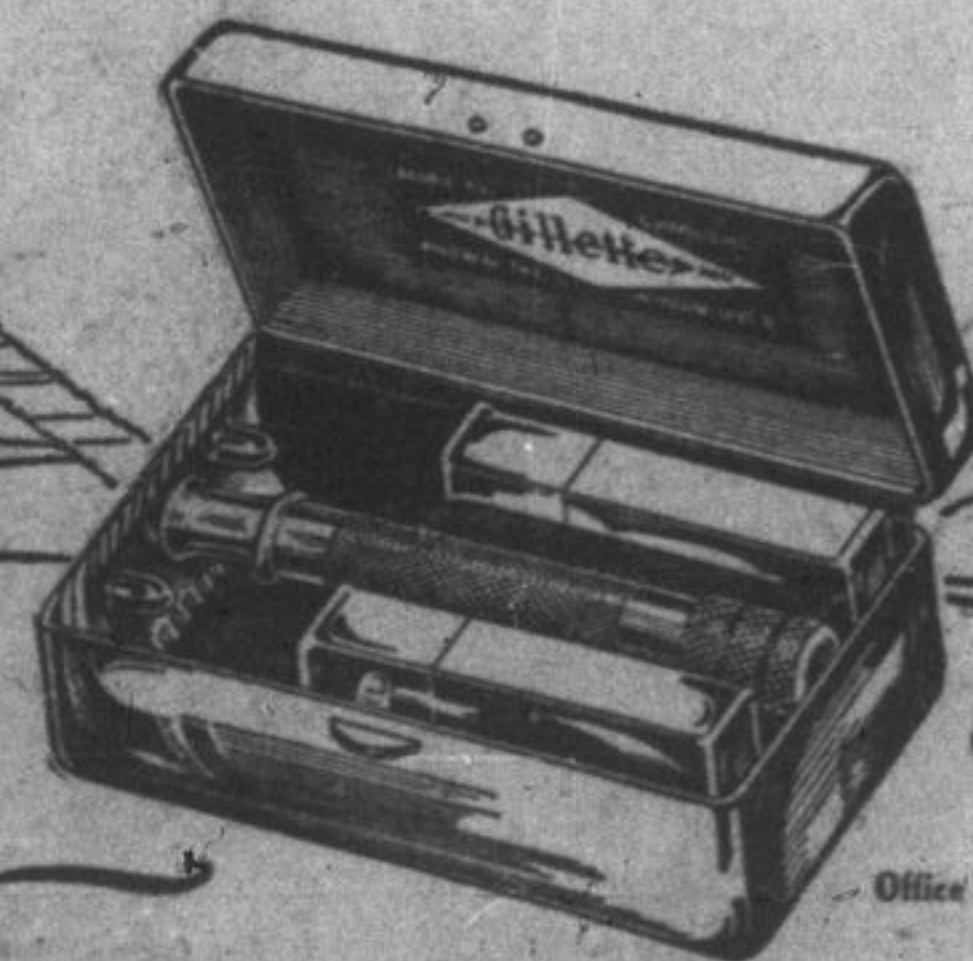
