If a short, prepossessing young lady nicknamed "Toady," who had her picture taken with "Bill" in "the grove" one summer's day and who lives somewhere in Military District No. 3 will get in touch with the Recorder and Times she will get back her photographs together with a number of other snapshots which were found beside the body of a redhaired lance-corporal of the 2nd Battalion on the battlefield recently by Pte. K. J. Owens, 2498049, of the 72nd British Columbia Battalion.

The photographs were forwarded to the Recorder and Times by this soldier with the request that an effort be made to locate the parties "I found them at the Amiens show beside a dead lance-corporal with red hair," Pte. Owens writes. hadn't time to find out who he was,

The snapshots are six in number and are evidently taken in a rural district. On the back of one appears, "Clare and Bill, taken in the Grove. Toad"; and on another there appears the wording, "Bill and myself taken in the Grove. Tophotographs appear to have been taken either in French-Canada or in France, one of them being posed in a roller rink and having a back-ground of signboard bearing French

The "snaps" bear evidence of havsoldier for a considerable period.
