Letters to the Editor

About Lieut.-Col. L. Saunders. Alice Street, Kingston, Oct. 19. (To the Editor): Last evening you published in your paper a notice about my son, Laurence Saunders.

The statements printed are not at all the facts, and I should be much obliged if you would have them corrected. He certainly was never court-martialed, nor did he go to France as a stowaway. Laurence Saunders was a co-partner in the firm of G. H. Smith and A. L. Saunders, realty brokers, Winnipeg, when war broke out. He enlisted as a private with the Fort Garry Horse, going to England with them, but later exchanged to the 90th Winnipeg Rifles (Little Black Devils), 15th Battalion. He went to France with the latter regiment when the first contingent went over, arriving there February 12th, 1915.

He was wounded at the second battle of Ypres and was in hospital six weeks. When he returned to his battalion he was made a lance-corporal and recommended for a commission, but was not gazetted until the following December. He won the Military Cross at Vimy Ridge, the bar to the M.C. at Hill 70. He got his promotion step by step, always in the same regiment. In the fall of 1917 he was sent to Aldershot to take the senior officers' course. Last month, or the end of August, he was promoted to lieutenant-colonel of his battalion, and awarded the D.S.O.

It is quite possible that in the information given you he was confused with another A. L. Saunders, as we know of at least four of this name who were at the front at one time.

By an American Newspaper—A Heroic Record. What a wonderful achievement has been that which Canada presents in this war. A population of but little over 7,000,000 sends over half a million men and is still dispatching troops to the fields of France and Belgium.

No more unselfish and heroic record could be presented by a colony. Here was Canada 3,000 miles away from England, separated from the politics of Europe, yet keenly sympathetic to everything that concerned the homeland and turning instantly to give its help in time of trouble.

The sacrifice of the Canadian soldiers has been as great as that of any troops, even the French. They were in the battle line early their regiments were reduced to mere handfuls, still they fought on, sending back for reinforcing troops from their own home communities. There has been a marvellous achievement, one that makes of a strong people an even more vigorous nation, fit for the mighty tasks before them in the immediate years.
