Gerald O. Stevenson, Queen's University, has left for Ottawa for a few days.

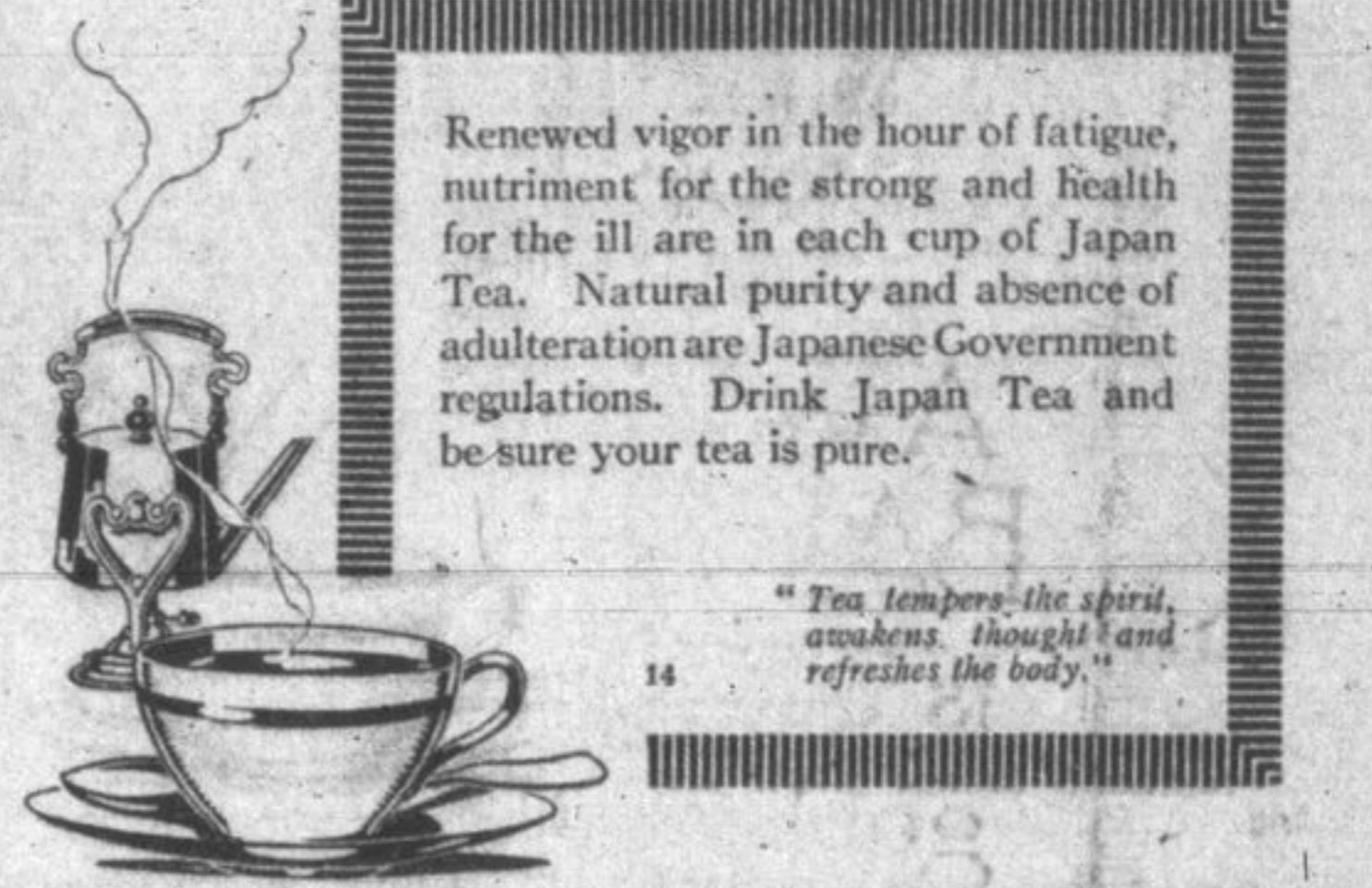
