G.W.V.A. HOSPITAL FULL INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

ALL THE CASES THERE ARE REPORTED DOING WELL.

Family of Eight Well on the Way to Recovery—Two Trained Nurses Are in Charge.

The emergency hospital at the G.W.V.A. rooms is working at full pressure to-day. There are now twenty-five cases attended to, the majority of them being children. When the Whig representative called there the children were all looking very bright and seemed to be very comfortable. The family of eight children who were admitted on Friday afternoon, and who are now being reported every hour, are in not a single empty bed, and some of the beds are being occupied by two small children.

The appeal for gifts of clothing, toys and picture books has met with a generous response, and one room looks like a dry goods store. Many of the garments received are quite new, while others are only slightly worn. It is expected that as each child is sent home on recovery, a full outfit of winter clothing will be provided.

William Smith, the energetic secretary of the G.W.V.A., has been rendering valuable assistance in fitting up the rooms as a hospital, and it was learned with great regret that he has fallen a victim to the epidemic. He is being greatly missed by the workers, and his place will be hard to fill during his illness. His mother is one of the most active workers.

The Army and Navy Veterans have offered a part of their building to be used as an emergency hospital. The whole top floor of the building has been cleared out, and the beds have been secured. On this floor there are about twelve private rooms which are being fitted up ready for patients. The hospital is ready for use by noon to-day, and is being reserved for adult patients. The Ontario Women's Emergency Corps is making arrangements for the provision of nurses and V.A.D. workers to take charge.

The plan is to have every business man attach a Victory Loan "sticker" to all his correspondence. These "stickers" are now being distributed by a most energetic committee. The suggestion has also been made that every business man sign his letter, "Years for the Victory Loan of 1918." These two suggestions should be a great help.

All over the Kingston district much interest is being manifested in the Victory Loan drive. The local workers were overjoyed on Monday morning to learn that the Liberty Loan in the United States had been over-subscribed by \$150,000,000. They are confident that Canada can do likewise and that Kingston and the district can set the pace for all Canada.

About Calling Doctors.

The physicians of the city are doing their best to cope with the epidemic situation but are being worked far beyond the limit and are still unable to cope with the situation. People could ease the position of the doctors to a very great extent if they would use a little forethought and common sense. The best thing to do is to send in calls early in the morning. Then the doctor can lay out and systematize his work for the day and greater economy of time. Some are sending in two or three calls a day for cases not at all serious and worrying the physicians unnecessarily. Other patients, in much greater need of attention, have in this way sometimes to go without the doctor's services. Call the doctor when you are first taken ill and after that only when it is absolutely necessary. Think of other people.
