TENDING TO THE AFFLICTED

IN EMERGENCY HOSPITALS AT VETERANS' HEADQUARTERS.

Generous Gifts of Supplies.—Wife of Private Batman Dies While Husband and Little Son Are in Other Hospitals.

Things are going along smoothly Tuesday at the G.W.V.A. emergency hospital. Four new cases were admitted Monday, and one patient was discharged as recovered. This was a son of Pte. Batman, who is seriously ill in Queen's Military Hospital, and the late Mrs. Batman, who died in Hotel Dieu Monday. The little fellow was taken home by Ald. H. W. Newman, who will care for him until his father has recovered. The hospital is working at full capacity, and all the patients are making satisfactory progress. Generous gifts of supplies are being received daily, and any surplus after all the wants of the patients in the hospital are attended to, are distributed amongst needy families who are being treated in their homes.

The Army and Navy Veterans' Association has its emergency hospital in full swing. This hospital is being used for the treatment of soldiers and their families who have been stricken by influenza. There are at present six cases in the private wards on the second floor of the building, and all of them are returned soldiers. Amongst them are ex-Pte. J. Wright, of the armouries staff, residing at 9 Victoria Terrace; Pte. Marquette, Clergy street, whose wife and entire family are suffering from influenza; Lieut. Barrett, 1st Battalion, who recently returned from overseas. Twelve other cases of returned soldiers and their families, who are in needy circumstances owing to the epidemic, have been reported, and the Army and Navy Veterans are taking steps to secure relief. One case on Orchard street is that of a 38th Battalion man, his wife and family who are all helpless, and are very much in need of attention. Gunner Herbert Saunders, 3rd Battalion, a returned man, whose wife died of influenza last week, and his six children, are all suffering from the disease at their home on Raglan road.

The husband of Mrs. Batman, 288 Queen street, who died in the Hotel Dieu Monday, is seriously ill in Queen's Military Hospital. Pte. Batman sent a message asking that the Army and Navy Veterans take charge of his wife's remains and make arrangements for the funeral, which took place Tuesday at 2 p.m. from Corbett's undertaking parlors.

The Army and Navy Veterans are sending out supplies of bovvil to all needy cases. These bottles are sent out under the supervision of the S.O.S. The Veterans have a car on duty with the S.O.S. night and day, and all cases reported are immediately investigated.

Mayor Hughes is untiring in his efforts to assist in fighting the epidemic. From the start he has been most active in locating cases where assistance has been needed, and has taken an active part in the work of providing hospital accommodation for them. Since Friday last the mayor has acted as ambulance driver, stretcher-bearer, emergency medical officer, and hospital attendant, in addition to attending to the supply of food, clothing and necessities for the emergency hospitals.

More Cases; Fewer Deaths.

There has been a slight increase in the number of hospital cases of influenza since Monday, but there have been fewer deaths from all causes. The following are the revised figures:

A returned soldier remarked that it reminded him of the shell-torn roads in Flanders. The patients in the ambulances certainly had a very rough ride before reaching the hospitals.
