FINED FIFTY AND COSTS

FOR MAKING STATEMENT DE-TRIMENTAL TO CANADA'S CAUSE

William McFarlane, of Joyceville, Found Guilty of One Charge and Allowed Off on Suspended Sentence on Another.

Magistrate Farrell, on Friday morning, found William McFarlane, a farmer of Joyceville, guilty on two charges of having made statements that would have a tendency to weaken the cause of the people of Canada in the war. He was found guilty of having, at Sand Hill, made the remark that Canadian soldiers who were wounded were not provided for by the Government. On this charge he was fined \$50 and costs.

On the second charge, that of having declared at a meeting of the Joyceville branch of the United Farmers of Ontario that "conspiration was the d—d farce ever perpetrated on the people of Canada," and that "ninety-nine out of every hundred soldiers sent overseas are sightseers." The accused was allowed to go on suspended sentence. He will be called upon to pay the costs of the court, and was also bound over in two sureties of \$500 each, to be of good behavior in the future. T. J. Rigney appeared on behalf of McFarlane, and J. L. Whiting conducted the prosecution.

Six witnesses were called on behalf of the defence when the cases was resumed.

Thomas Shortell told about attending the meeting at Joyceville on or about August 1st. It was a meeting of the united farmers, and was presided over by the accused, Mr. McFarlane, who is the president of the Joyceville branch of the United Farmers.

Questioned about the remarks credited to McFarlane, about recruiting being a farce, witness said that to the best of his knowledge McFarlane made no such statement. He did not remember him saying anything to this effect. He might have said something about conscription, but witness did not hear him. Witness did not hear him make any statement about ninety out of every hundred soldiers going overseas as sightseers.

To Mr. Whiting, witness recalled what he termed a "racket" between a man in the audience named Mundell and Mr. McFarlane, but he could throw no light whatever on what the "racket" was about.

James Haney, Thomas Baker, William Wilson, Michael Shortell and Patrick Keyes were also witnesses. Michael Shortell and Patrick Keyes were not present when McFarlane was speaking, and the others swore they did not hear him make the statement it was alleged he had made.

Magistrate Farrell, Mr. Rigney and Mr. Whiting tried hard to get the story of what did occur at the meeting. One witness spoke of what he called a "chewing match" between Mundell and McFarlane, but he could not say what it was all about.

Mr. Rigney recalled Mr. McFarlane to the witness stand, and a printed circular was produced showing the meeting at Joyceville had been called by the Joyceville branch of the United Farmers of Ontario. Witness told of presiding at the meeting, at which he said he should be pleased to secure the names of any of the farmers who had not yet joined the association, and at this Mr. Mundell interrupted, saying that he understood the association was formed to break down the Government.

Witness replied, stating that he had no knowledge of the association being formed for any such purpose as this. The hall was very dark, there being but one light, and he could not see who was making all the remarks, but there was a disturbance. He heard some say that associations of this kind were trying to stop recruiting. Witness said he had never tried to stop recruiting, and he heard someone in the hall cry, "You are a liar." At this witness asked Mr. Mundell to come up to the platform and he did so. Mr. Mundell then spoke of having a brother in the war. Witness said he resented the statement that he was trying to prevent recruiting. He said the association had 123 members, and that no effort had been made to prevent recruiting.

Witness declared most emphatically that he had never made the statements about recruiting and the soldiers going overseas as credited to him.

Conflict of Evidence.

Mr. Rigney said there had been a conflict of evidence. One could tell by reading between the lines that ill-feeling had existed between certain parties before the meeting. There was the question of the accuracy of some of the evidence. It was remarkable that witnesses had been able to tell what McFarlane had said verbatim on this one matter, while they could not tell a solitary thing about other matters he had talked about. Witnesses called for the defence could not swear that he had never said what he was credited with saying, and the court should place as much confidence in their evidence as in the case of a man who was "cock sure" about a thing. The Government had rightly passed a law to prevent statements being made which might tend to weaken the past Canada is taking in the war, but Mr. Rigney felt that the intent and object of this case would be met if in this charge the accused was allowed to go on suspended sentence. The tendency was to prevent lack of unity just now. This was the first case of its kind in this community, and the publicity would go far in preserving law and order. If the statements as alleged were made through viciousness, Mr. Rigney said he would be the last to raise his hand to condone anything of this kind.

"I have not the least doubt that McFarlane made use of the language stated," said Magistrate Farrell, but added that he had a good deal of sympathy with the argument as presented by Mr. Rigney. There were two political camps, and no doubt a good deal of passion had been aroused.

"I feel that under the conditions

this affair took place that the ends of justice will be justified if sentence is suspended in this one charge," remarked the magistrate.

Mr. Whiting made no statement, but asked that the defendant pay the costs of the court, and to this the magistrate agreed, also adding that the defendant must put a couple of bonds of \$500 each to be of good behaviour in the future. These bonds will be secret.

The case created much interest in the county, and but for the order of the Board of Health the court room would have been filled to overflowing with spectators.
