WEEK WITHOUT THEATRES

THEATRICAL COMPANIES AND "MOVIES" HARD HIT.
 Citizens Are Busily Engaged in Caring for the Sick—Not Known Just When Ban Will be Lifted on Schools, Theatres and Churches.
 Kingston has now had a week without theatres. It came at first as quite a shock, but owing to the fact that there has been so much sickness and so many deaths, the citizens have certainly taken the move on the part of the Board of Health as a good one.
 Never before in the mind of the average citizen has there been no "line up" at theatres here for tickets. The "movies" have always been very popular in this city, and now for once they are motionless, presenting nothing but blank walls and locked doors to the passerby.
 Citizens cannot recall when the churches were closed, and there will be good reason for the citizens to remember the epidemic of 1918. It is in the fall of the year and during the winter that so many church services and meetings are held, but the order of the Board of Health putting a ban on all public gatherings is being strictly observed. There has been a marked falling off in the number of people seen on the street, and all this goes to show that the people of Kingston are doing their utmost to check the epidemic.
 Employees of the theatres are having a forced holiday as a result of the closing, and theatrical companies have been given quite a setback. Companies out on the road have been puzzled to know just what to do, as in so many places where the shows have been booked to appear the lid has been put on tight and many companies have returned to New York, to await the opening of the playhouses. It is not known as yet just when the ban will be lifted on the schools, theatres and churches.
 As regards the theatres, however, there is so much sickness that it is doubtful if there would be a corporal's guard at any performance, even if they were opened just at the present time, as there is much work for willing hands to do in the way of relieving the sick. Many homes have sickness, and if it is not one's own home, it is in the home of a relative or friend, and this calls for service on their part.

HARD ON THE LOAFERS NO WARRANT NEEDED

Any Peace Officer Is Now Justified in Making an Arrest.

Kendall, which, with the assistance of the tug Seymour, released the stranded craft.
