## Military News

Barrfield camp has been closed for the season. The last of the medical troops who were stationed there struck camp on Friday and returned to quarters in the city.

Lieut. D. Evans, quartermaster, Ontario Military Hospital, Cobourg, was in Kingston on duty all this week and returned to Cobourg on Friday.

The attention of all ranks is called to paragraph 1459, K.R. and O. for Canadian Militia, 1917, which states that all officers, soldiers and colors passing a military funeral will salute the body.

Pts. J. A. Draper, 1st Depot Battalion, E.O.R., has been taken on the strength of C Battery, R.C.H.A.

The military funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon at two o'clock of Sergt. Artillery Clerk A. J. Crook, late R.C.H.A., who died in Queen's Military Hospital on Friday. The late sergeant enlisted for overseas service with the R.C.H.A. three years ago, but owing to his exceptional abilities as a clerk, he was detained in Canada for duty at the Tete de Pont barracks. Two months ago he was applied for permission to transfer to the Siberian forces, but was refused permission. He was a very popular and conscientious N.C.O., and will be greatly missed by his colleagues.

Gunner Thomas Hewitt, 73rd Battery, has been discharged to civil life as medically unfit for further service.

All ranks of the R.C.H.A. received their third inoculation with anti-influenza serum on Saturday morning at ten o'clock.

Capt. J. Howard Box, M.C., who belongs to the Snowball Brigade, medical unit, has, along with Lieut. Hendry Connell, sailed from a Pacific port for Siberia. Capt. Box has been made adjutant of his unit and when Vladivostok is reached a stationary hospital will at once be set up.
