Happenings in the City and Vicinity

Mayor Hughes, who has been ill, is able to be up and will be out in a few days.

Police Constable Leslie Clark, who has been laid up with the "flu," is reported to be much better.

Harold Day, King street west, who has been very ill of influenza for the past two weeks, remains ill about the same condition.

Two drunks were before Magistrate Farrel on Monday morning. One was fined \$10 and costs and the other was remanded.

The infant son of William Fairbairn, engineer on the G.T.R., died in Belleville, and the body was brought to Kingston for burial on Sunday.

The four-year-old son of Capt. Levellotte, of the tug Coteau, died on Sunday as the vessel was making her way from Montreal to Kingston.

Police Constable James Cotter has resumed duty after being laid up with influenza. His son, ill with the "flu," was reported to be much better.

Through a printer's error in Saturday's issue it was stated that Mrs. Mellroy was given a month in jail for hoarding. The sentence was one hour in jail.

The S.O.S. call on Sunday for volunteer workers to assist in homes where sickness prevailed, met with a good response, but still more workers are required.

Howard Burns, aged fifteen, was removed from St. Mary's-on-the-Lake orphanage to the Hotel Dieu by M. P. Keys' ambulance on Sunday. The lad is a son of John Burns, of Regina.

Although there were quite a number of deaths during the weekend, the doctors report a marked decrease in the number of new cases of influenza. The hospitals report the situation improved.

During the early hours of Sunday morning—the earliest in the de Pont Barracks was the scene of a burglary. The thief or thieves ransacked the place. There is to be a court of inquiry to probe into the affair.

Barnet Lipman, Brock street, received word that his son, Dr. A. Lipman, is very ill of influenza at St. Joseph's Island, near Sault Ste. Marie. His daughter, Miss Sophia Lipman, left Sunday afternoon to attend him.

Hon. W. P. Jones of Woodstock, N.B., arrived in the city on Sunday on a visit to his son, Sergt. C. J. Jones, R.S.A., who is seriously ill at Queen's Military Hospital. He is accompanied by his daughter and his son's wife.

The Salvation Army band paraded the streets all Sunday afternoon and held religious services on corners. Citizens expressed their deep appreciation of Ensign Smith's action, which brought comfort and cheer to many sad hearts.

The death of David Maynard, aged eighty-two, occurred at the General Hospital on Sunday. The deceased was born at Cloyme and was a retired farmer. The funeral took place from R. J. Rehr's undertaking parlors to Cataract cemetery on Sunday.

The Kaiser "tell tale" was erected on the market square Monday morning, and will tell the story of the campaign as it progresses from day to day. Mrs. R. White, of this city, made the painting of the Kaiser, and her work has brought much favorable comment.

The Board of Health members, after a conference on Saturday afternoon, decided to close the pool rooms for this week as a further preventative of the influenza epidemic. It is considered under control, and next Sunday the churches will open and on Monday next schools, theatres and pool rooms will again operate.

CAPT. C. G. CARRUTHERS, M.C.

Reported Seriously Wounded in the Chest With Gunshot.

J. B. Carruthers has received a telegram from the secretary of the British War Office, saying that his son, Capt. C. G. Carruthers, M.C., was reported on Oct. 25th, as admitted to No. 39 General Hospital, Calais, seriously ill with gunshot wound in the chest. Capt. Carruthers was with the Dublin Fusiliers, and was with his regiment in India when war was declared. He served in the Dardanelles campaign, where he was wounded. Later he went to France, where he was wounded once before, but was able to return to his regiment.

MORE FINES WERE IMPOSED

For Statements Tending to Weaken Canada's Efforts in War.

After a hearing, which lasted for two hours and a half, Magistrate Farrel, on Monday morning, found William Reynolds and Byron Rutan, of Harrowmith, guilty of having made statements tending to weaken the cause of Canada in the war. Rutan was fined \$200, or in default of payment, three months in jail. Reynolds was fined \$150, or in default, three months in jail. J. L. Whiting conducted the prosecution. T. J. Rigney appeared for the accused and put in a plea of "not guilty."

LIEUT. ROY GOODEARLE KILLED ON OCT. 23RD

Was With the Royal Air Force—Son of Late Humphrey Goodearle.

Harold Goodearle received the following cable Monday morning informing him of the death of his brother, Lieut. Roy Goodearle of Royal Air Force, on Oct. 23rd: "London, Oct. 27, 1918.

"Regret to inform you that Lieut. F. R. Goodearle, R.A.F., is reported to have been killed Oct. 23rd. The Air Council express sympathy. (Sgt.) Secretary Air Ministry."

The late Lieut. Goodearle was an arts student at Queen's University, and volunteered for overseas service. He was granted a commission in the infantry and transferred to the R.A.F. in England. He was a son of the late Humphrey Goodearle, and is survived by his brother, Harold, and one sister, May, both of whom reside in this city. The deceased was an active member of St. James' church and Sunday school, and the news of his death is received with much regret.

Pte. F. J. Fagan Gassed.

Mrs. Eliza Fagan, 307 Montreal street, received a telegram this morning from the Director of Records, Ottawa, stating that her son, Pte. Frederick John Fagan, had been "mustard gassed" and admitted to General Hospital, Camiers, France. He left Hamilton with the 13th C.M.R. under Major W. A. Stroud, in March, 1916. Later he transferred to the 18th Battalion Infantry. He has been two years in France, and is but twenty-one years of age at the present time.

PRIVATE W. MOORE DEAD.

Formerly Lived at Portsmouth—Went Overseas in 1915.

Word was received from Ottawa on Thursday to the effect that Private Melville Moore, of Portsmouth, had died of wounds in the Ninth Field Ambulance on Oct. 1st. The late Private Moore was a veteran of the South African war, and before enlisting in the European war lived nearly all his life at Portsmouth, but three years previous moved to Watertown, N.Y., and was employed at William Madhu's as plumber and fitter. He went overseas three years and four months ago, and was nearly all that time in France. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Moore of Portsmouth. He is survived by his wife in England, one sister and three brothers: Mrs. A. Forsythe, Portsmouth; Thomas and Hyla, of Watertown; and George, of Dayton, Ohio.
