ON TURKISH SOIL BY ENTRY INTO DARDANELLES.

Turkey Must Also Deliver Up For Trial Certain Persons Accused of Disregarding Rules of Civilized Warfare.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, Oct. 31 .- A note from Turkey asking for peace is expected momentarily by the Allied Governments, the Daily Expressy says understands. The Allies, the newspaper add, will demand complete and unconditional surrender. In order to insure compliance with their demands, the Express continues, the Allies will insist that Turkey permit their fleets to pass the Dardanelles, and an adequate force to be landed on Turkish soil. Turkey must also deliver up certain persons accused of disregarding the rules of civilized warfare. These dividuals will be tried, and if found guilty will be punished.

## Berlin-Vienna Railway Is Cut

(Canadian Press Despatch) Paris, Oct. 31 .- Communication between Agram and Fiume, and Budapest and Vienna has been totally interrupted. The Czecho-Slovaks have cut the ratiroad between Berlin and Vienna, near Bodenbach, and German trains can go only as far as Schnadau. The Crotian Parliament at Agram has voted for a total separation of Crotia, Slavonia and Dalmatia from Hungary. The despatch says that Agram is decked in national colors and that the people are celebrating the passage of the resolution

Fiume is the principal seaport of Hungary. Agram is the capital of Crotia and Slavonia, is situated near the Save river, seventy-five miles inland, Bodenbach, where the railroad between Berlin and Vienna has been cut, is a town in Bohemia near the Saxon frontier and is situated on the Elbe river.



# TO GO TO COUNTRY ITALIANS TAKE

Are Pressing Forward From the

THE BATTLELINE PRESSES CLOSELY ON THEIR HEELS.

One Enemy Army Corps in a Very Critical Situation-Italians Have Reached the Livenza River.

With the Italian Armies in the Field, Oct. 31 .- The Italians have extended their offensive southward to the Adriatic, increasing the width of their drive to a front of more than 100 kilometres (62 miles). They are now pressing forward from

the Grappa region to the sea. The Italians have reached the Livenza river, twelve miles east of the Plave. Vittorio, the great Austrian base, is situated on the west bank.
