AUSTRIA GIVES UP EVERYTHING

Surrenders Arms, Munitions, Railways, Warships And Prisoners.

GERMANY OVER THE TERRITORY OF AUSTRIA.

The Terms of the Armistice are to be Carried Out Under the Direction of Marshal Foch.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Washington, Nov. 4.—The terms under which the debacle on the Italian front ended to-day (9 a.m., eastern American time) include the complete demobilization of Austrian forces, the surrender of one-half of all artillery and military equipment.

Ships to be surrendered include fifteen modern Austrian submarines, three battleships, three light cruisers, nine destroyers, twelve torpedo boats, one mine-layer and six Danube monitors to be designated by the Allies.

All German troops in Austria are to be controlled and disarmed under Allied direction. Free navigation of all Austrian waters by both war and commercial fleets of the Allies is provided for.

All Austrian naval air craft are to be put out of commission and concentrated under Allied control.

All Austrian harbor and other equipment in occupied Italian ports is to be left untouched.

Ships to be surrendered include fifteen modern Austrian submarines, three battleships, three light cruisers, nine destroyers, twelve torpedo boats, one mine-layer and six Danube monitors to be designated by the Allies.

COURT TO TRY WAR CRIMINALS

Is Advocated by Sir Frederick Smith, British Attorney-General.

WOULD NOT ALLOW ACCUSED TO SHIFT THE RESPONSIBILITY TO SUPERIORS.

The Court Should be Composed of Allied Representatives — Power of Sentencing to Death or to Prison.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, Nov. 4.—The establishment of a grand court of Allied representatives, civil and military, for the purpose of trying those guilty of crimes during the war, is advocated by Sir Frederick Smith, British Attorney-General.

Sir Frederick, who is an authority on international law, urges that the jurisdiction of such a court applies especially, although not exclusively, to those caught redhanded or observed committing crimes.

GERMANY'S DECISION TO BE KNOWN SOON

The Allied Terms Very Stiff—Suicidal For Germany to Keep Fighting.

London, Nov. 4.—It will soon be learned whether Germany is prepared to capitulate on the Allies' terms, or will endeavor to carry on the war for a few weeks or months based on all fronts by superior force.

382,355 CAPTURED ON WESTERN FRONT

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Paris, Nov. 4.—Since the great offensive began on the western front the prisoners taken number 382,355; cannon, 6,217; machine guns, 38,622; mine throwers, 3,907.

London, Nov. 4.—The Canadian casualty office states that the casualties during the last two and a half months of fighting are 40,000 Canadian non-commissioned officers and men and 1,700 officers.

GERMAN SOCIALISTS ARE NOT SATISFIED WITH THE EMPEROR'S CONCESSIONS.
