The Allied Terms Very Stiff-Suicidal For Germany to Keep Fighting.

London, Nov. 4 .- It will soon be learned whether Germany is prepared to capitulate on the Allies' terms, or will endeavor to carry on the war for a few weeks or months beset on all fronts by superior forces. It is announced that the terms of armistice have been practically completed by the Council of the Allies at Versailles. They are said to be pretty stiff, including a demand that the German army shall retire to a line thirty miles east of the Rhine, leaving behind its munitions and rolling stock, and the German s fleet, including submarines, shall be turned over to the Allies as a pledge of the sincere desire of the German people to make peace. The placing of the border cities of the Rhineland under keeping of Foch's armies and the handing over of Germany's submarines would make a renewal of hostilities by Germany a suicidal proceeding. If an armistice is concluded on these terms peace will inevitably follow. A few days should disclose the German programme.
