### Military News

An appointment has been made filling the post formerly held by Major Southey as representative in Kingston of the Soldiers' Aid Commission. Major Southey is now a patient undergoing treatment at the Ontario Military Hospital, Cabourg, and his place is to be filled by Lieut. J. A. Sanford, who until recently was a patient in the same institution.

Bdr. H. A. Baynham, Depot Field Battery, has been transferred to No. 3 Battalion, Canadian Garrison Regiment.

Major the Rev. H. I. Horsey, who has been ill with influenza at Ottawa, has recovered and is expected at his office on Tuesday.

Lieut.-Col. W. J. Morgan, of Kingston, who reverted in rank in order to get overseas, is now in France.

The situation respecting the epidemic of influenza has very much improved in the military hospitals of this district. At the end of the month of October the number of patients was 239, which is the lowest since Oct. 18th, when the total number was 642. Instructions have been issued requiring that every case must be reported to the D.G.M.S. and the A.D.M.S. within twenty-four hours after admission and the next of kin are to be notified immediately.

Rev. Father Sjugouin has been taken on the chaplain service, M.D. No. 3, in place of Father Capt. the Rev. J. J. Salmon, who is ill.

The Military "Y" will reopen its entertainment season on Tuesday evening with a programme of motion pictures and music. The entertainment programme at the Military "Y" for the rest of the week is as follows: Thursday evening, a concert arranged by Misses Frances and Phyllis Devlin; Saturday evening, a combined concert and social. The programme is being arranged for by the ladies of the First Baptist church.

The R.C.H.A. band was to have paraded through the downtown section on Monday at noon, in connection with the Victory Loan campaign. Owing to the inclement weather and the fact that the band had to take part in two military funerals during the day, this parade had to be cancelled.
