Military News

Wilfred Lockett, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Lockett, 23 Sydenham street, has enlisted in the Canadian navy as a wireless operator, and left for Ottawa on Saturday. He is eighteen years of age.

The military authorities are apparently making sure that there will be no shortage of coal for the military offices, barracks, hospitals and premises this winter. Six hundred tons of this coal is being sent to Fort Henry, and the remainder is being set down on the parade ground at the Artillery Park Barracks.
