

If Germany Accepts--

Before this is in type Germany may have accepted the Allies' terms of armistice.

But, that would not mean that the Victory Loan would not be needed.

PTE. ED. LIVINGSTONE KILLED IN ACTION

He Was Twenty Years of Age—Belonged to the First Baptist Church.
William James Livingstone, 2 Toronto street, received an official telegram Wednesday morning, informing him that his son, Pte. Edward Livingstone, is officially reported killed in action on Oct. 11th. Pte. Livingstone was born and educated in Kingston, and was twenty years of age. He enlisted in the 146th Battalion, went overseas in September, 1916, and was transferred to the 26th Battalion in France in February of the following year. In November, 1917, he was wounded at Passchendaele, and was in England until about a month previous to his death, when he returned to France. The deceased soldier was a member of the First Baptist church, and the Orange Lodge. He is survived by his parents, one sister, Helen, at home, and one brother, Percy, who is a driver in the Canadian Field Artillery in France.

Burial of Miss Dunnett.
The funeral of the late Miss Margaret Dunnett, who died of influenza at Sudbury on Monday, took place Wednesday morning from the home of her parents, 280 Wellington street, to the Catholic cemetery. Rev. Dr. Macgillivray officiated at the burial service.

The pall-bearers were Dr. G. W. Bell, J. S. R. McCann, H. Sharp, John Sullivan, A. Hendry and A. Fraser. Many floral tributes were received. Mr. Dunnett received the following telegram from E. B. Blew, general manager of the Spirilla Company, Niagara Falls:
